Q. What is your role in the dual language program?

A. I am the Spanish side of the first grade dual language program. I teach Spanish native language students reading and writing and I also teach science and social studies in Spanish. My partner teacher is Lisa Braddock.

Q. Why is the dual language program a good fit at Edison?

A. Spanish is the native language for many of our students. One of goals at Edison is to help students connect with each other to build cross cultural relationships between students. The dual language program allows students to have peer role models as they are acquiring a second language.

Q. How much of the second language are students learning by first grade?

A. It depends on the student and how much support of their second language they are receiving at home. Right now we are focused on vocabulary. This is a critical age to learn language whether English or Spanish. We also use vocabulary in our singing and dancing to connect with students. We still consider all of our first graders to be at the beginning level in learning dual languages.

Q. Is the dual language program at Edison making a difference?

A. Our dual language program has improved after having it here for a few years. There are still challenges we work through because our students change and education changes. We continue to be flexible and do what is best for kids. Overall the program strengthens our community and helps with relationship building.
