**School Board Meeting Recap • May 4****Rausch reviews preliminary budget**  
*Reports cash fund balance on decline*

In a report to the school board last night, Business Manager Aron Rausch provided a preliminary budget overview for the 2004-2005 school year.

Rausch said early indications project more expenditures than revenue sources. He said enrollment will be budgeted at 20 fewer students based on trend studies.

"Walla Walla Public Schools is solid financially, but we will have to start finding ways to limit expenditures and reallocate existing costs," Rausch said. "Our cash fund balance is projected to decline and is approaching the established board minimum of 3 percent."

The Business Office will conduct a public budget work session early this summer to further review the budget. The district's general fund budget is expected to be near \$47 million next school year.

**District budget guidelines**

1. The Budgeting process will support our Mission and Strategic Plan.
2. Academic needs of students are our highest priority.
3. Academic standards for student learning and performance assessment will be maintained.
4. A fund balance at least in the 3 to 5 percent range will be maintained per Board direction.
5. Conservative student enrollment projections will be used.
6. Required services will be maintained; i.e., insurance, accounting systems, transportation, utilities, and necessary levels of service.
