Citizens for Schools chairs honored

School Board Meeting Recap • March 2**Reault ready to recommend permanently adding swim teams to Wa-Hi Athletics**

Deputy Superintendent **Judy Reault** reported to board members last night she will recommend at the March 16 board meeting to permanently add Wa-Hi girls and boys swim teams to the Wa-Hi Athletics Program.

If board members approve the request, the Wa-Hi Athletic Department budget for the girls and boys swim program would be \$37,500 per year. This includes an annual budget of \$2,700 for equipment and allows for an assistant coach for both boys and girls teams. The proposal calls for continued use of the Whitman College pool for competitions.

Reault praised the success of the district's two-year swim team pilot program. She reported 16 girls participated this year on a team which finished second in the Big 9 Conference. Twenty-four boys turned out for swimming this winter and the team finished third in the conference. Eight swimmers, boys and girls, qualified for state this year.

Reault walked board members through a summary of the district's pilot program. She said a committee of parents and administrators was formed in the Spring of 2001 for the purpose of developing swim teams at Wa-Hi. The group designed a pilot program which relied solely on fundraising efforts. The committee met all requirements of the proposal and the pilot program was launched in 2002 and continued through this year.

"This has been a true example of collaboration," Reault said. "This team effort has resulted in excellent communication and outstanding support for an important project."

Board members are expected to take action on this proposal March 16.

Board approves snow make-up day

School board members last night approved Friday, May 7 as the snow make-up day for the January 7 districtwide closure. Walla Walla Public Schools kept staff and students home January 7 due to a severe winter storm. The district also delayed school two-hours January 5, 6 and 15.

Animation Club helps Sharpstein students learn essentials

Sharpstein parents **Jeff** and **Kerri Tucker** have found a way to keep their son Peter from constantly asking them to buy video games when they go shopping.

They taught him how to create his own. Thanks to a new *Animation Club* created by the Tuckers, fellow Sharpstein students now have the opportunity to learn themselves.

Jeff Tucker is a computer expert and his wife is a teacher. In a report to school board members last night, they explained how they have combined their skills to teach students in grades 2-5 basic computer animation. This year 22 students have met twice a week to

participate in this high tech club activity.

The animation projects are designed to help students learn essential academic skills. Twenty-eight students are set to begin after spring break and there is even a waiting list to get a seat.

"We wanted to create a club that would capture the attention of the students," Jeff Tucker said to board members.

Tucker then showed a DVD with a collection of student animation projects. The Tuckers also thanked Principal **Laure Quaresma** and Library Media Specialist **Linda Seibold** for their support and help with this club.
