

Dave Meyer remembered across the district

Grief counselors on campus to provide support

After learning of longtime Walla Walla High School Social Studies teacher **David Meyer's** passing Tuesday morning, staff members across the district have been reflecting on his positive impact and influence.

"This is just the way Dave would have wanted it," Prospect Point Learning Specialist **Laura Reiter** said. "He would want us to put kids first and have a great school year."

Despite fighting a long and hard battle with cancer, Meyer always seemed to have a smile for everyone.

"Even when he was in school, he made time for everyone -- no matter what you looked like or who you hung out with," Payroll Specialist and fellow Wa-Hi Class of 1981 graduate **Tami Tucker** said.

Accounts Payable Technician **DeeDee Delaney** -- who also attended school with Meyer -- recalls how he had a way of getting people to work together and feel special.

"He was a natural leader," Delaney said. "People just wanted to be around him."

Meyer taught Social Studies and English at Walla Walla High School for 13 years. He also coached football, basketball and participated in numerous school activities and clubs.

Grief counselors will be on campus to meet with staff and students throughout the week. Counselors also met with high school football players to talk about the grieving process.

Funeral arrangements are still pending.

Board approves 2005-2006 budget *District remains fiscally sound*

With a rise in state mandated raises and increased health care costs -- combined with rising fuel costs, utilities equipment, supplies and materials -- the district for the third consecutive year was forced to dip into cash reserves to balance the \$49.2 million general fund budget.

Despite the rising costs, the district maintains a \$1.7 million cash reserve -- well within the school board's 3 to 5 percent reserve mandate.

"I want to commend our staff for all their work to help balance this budget in these trying fiscal times," Business Manager **Aron Rausch** said. "We are an extremely efficient school district and are able to provide countless services to students many districts would not even attempt."

Last school year Rausch formed a broad-based Budget Committee to review the budget and make suggestions for spending plans. Rausch said some of the suggestions were used in the preparation of the 2005-2006 budget.

"We will continue to rely on our committee to help with our budget," Rausch said. "School districts across the state are feeling the squeeze of increased mandates with less dollars to support them. We are proud to have a budget that covers the operating costs for our 6,000 students and the highly qualified professional staff we have in Walla Walla."

Principals making activities available for families in need during weekly Elementary Early Release

A schedule change for all elementary schools was adopted by the school board last spring to begin with the 2005-2006 school year.

Every Wednesday beginning August 31 (no early release on first day of school), elementary children will be dismissed one hour early to provide time for teacher collaboration, training and long-range program planning.

School buses will run the same routes on Wednesday — only one hour earlier. Elementary principals will work with teachers and parents to provide supervision alternatives for those families unable to arrange for after-school care on early release Wednesdays.
