Board approves Elementary early release plan

Weekly release allows time for teachers to learn together

School Board members last night adopted a Professional Development and Collaboration plan for elementary schools set to begin next school year. Blue Ridge Principal **Linda Boggs** - who will assume Assistant Superintendent duties this summer -- said in her report to the school board the plan (detailed below) is designed to provide consistent time for teachers to learn together.

"As instructional leaders who have extensively researched the effectiveness of consistent collaboration time to enhance learning, we collectively believe providing professional development within the work day is an effective model," Elementary principals said in a letter sent home last week to all parents with children enrolled in district elementary schools.

Positive feedback from staff and parents for teacher professional development and collaboration over the years -- and successful secondary late start efforts - reinforced the decision, Boggs said.

Elementary Schools Professional Development and Collaboration plan outline *(begins this fall)*

- Elementary staff will have the opportunity for weekly collaboration each Wednesday afternoon. Students will be dismissed an hour early on Wednesday afternoon. Bus schedules will be adjusted to accommodate the early release schedule.
- Elementary principals will work with teachers and parents to provide supervision alternatives for those families unable to arrange for after school care. Individual schools will share specific information with families in the fall.
- Instructional time will be made up within the weekly building schedule.

Enrollment finishes above projections

With the final 2004-2005 school year enrollment count recently tallied, the district finished the year 148 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) students above beginning year budget projections according to a report from Executive Director of Personnel **Dr. Bill Jordan**.

The count comes as good news as the additional revenue generated from the FTE students over 2004-2005 budget projections will keep the district from dipping deeper into its cash reserves to balance the general fund budget.

The 2004-2005 budget -- when approved last August -- was projected to dig \$1.2 million into cash reserves. District Business Manager **Aron Rausch** says it is too early to determine just how much the district will have to take out of cash reserves this year now that the enrollment counts are in, but he says it should be under the \$1.2 million projection.

"School board members continue to support our conservative budgeting practices, especially when it comes to projecting enrollment," Rausch said. "Our budget for an upcoming school year is approved long before we ever see the kids."

The district projects beginning year FTE students for budgeting purposes on the previous year's enrollment, economic trends and community growth estimates.

The district's enrollment grew slightly this year, up just 18 FTE students from last year.

- approved minutes of regular board meeting May 3, 2005, Personnel and Out of State Travel Reports, Request for proposals for Architectural Services, 2005-2006 Head Start Grant Application, Sale of Surplus Materials, Increase in Meal Prices, Payment of May bills and payroll.
- were thanked for their support and participation in the 2003-2004 Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program. Blue Ridge Bilingual Teacher **Brenda Hall** was recognized for her leadership in hosting families and traveling abroad through this program. The program allows teachers to apply to the program to teach overseas for a year, semester or six-week period. Applications will be accepted for the 2006-2007 program cycle until Oct. 15, 2005.
