**Sixty-one Lincoln High School students graduate**

Thursday night family and friends packed the Walla Walla Fairgrounds Community Building to salute Lincoln High School's Class of 2012 graduates. This year 61 seniors graduated from Lincoln High School. Principal Jim Sporleder says this is a record number.

"These are amazing kids who have so much to offer," Sporleder said. "We are proud of our seniors and are thankful they shared part of their lives with us."

Cesar Zuniga is the Class of 2012 Valedictorian. He plans to attend the University of Idaho this fall and study to be an electrical engineer. Johannah Paine and Heidi Schoessler are the school's Salutatorians.

"This school takes students you never thought would have graduated, myself included, and pushes them to overcome all the barriers that have been holding them back," Schoessler said. The staff care so much about the students and gave us the strength we needed to get here today."

### **Lincoln High School Resource Officer promoted to new position**

Today is the last day for Lincoln High School Resource Kevin Braman. Braman was recently promoted to City of Walla Walla police sergeant following the retirement of Sergeant Dennis McKee. Braman's replacement at Lincoln High School has yet to be named.

"It has been my pleasure for the last three years to serve the Walla Walla School District as the WWPD School Resource Officer," Braman said. "Although I look forward to the next challenge in my career as a police sergeant, I am going to miss the students and staff tremendously"

#### Braman took time to reflect on his experience at Lincoln High School:

"As a police officer in the city for eight years prior to being submersed in the school full-time, I was solving problems and dealing with the worst situations in our society. I seldom had time to sit down with a young person and talk about their problems and why they were experiencing each situation. As an SRO, I was able to connect with so many kids and take the time to really make a difference. Not only would this mean enforcing the law, but it also equated to explaining why rules are in place and examining how the situation could be avoided or dealt with differently in the future. I feel this is the key to changing behavior and look forward to teaching this experience to other new police officers as they begin their careers.

I have also learned to have more compassion for others, as I have seen kids who have overcome some huge challenges. It has proven to me that children are resilient and will flourish with the right positive environment around them. I have seen a remarkable difference at Lincoln in the past three years.

On my first day as SRO at Lincoln in the Fall of 2009, I witnessed and broke up a fight in the lunch room. I responded to 48 different police reportable incidents at Lincoln alone in my first year. There was very high gang tension in the building and the staff were overwhelmed trying to avoid the next incident.

The following year Lincoln began its transformation with the study of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and Complex Trauma and implementation of a different approach. From the 2009-10 School year to the 2010-11 school year, my police reports at Lincoln dropped from 48 to 17! I have yet to acquire the 11-12 year end statistics, however I am certain that the trend will continue. We still have arrests and police reports at Lincoln and the SRO's role in the process is important for success. I feel that the recidivism rate has dropped tremendously due to our approach and response. The Lincoln Health Center has also been instrumental in this transformation by providing both medical and mental health services to the kids.

I have been extremely fortunate to have been able to experience the staff and students at all schools and look forward to continuing my relationship with everyone. I will be assigned as a Patrol Sergeant and will be out and about in the community on a daily basis."

### **Edison Physical Education teacher receives national award for innovative teaching**

Edison Elementary Physical Education teacher Patrick McFetridge was recognized by the Character Education Partnership as a 2012 Promising Practice winner for his “Five Star Practice.”

CEP awarded 297 Promising Practices to schools, districts, and organizations from across the United States, as well as from Brazil, Canada, Hong Kong, and Mexico.

The “Five Star Practice” is incorporated in McFetridge’s PE classes at Edison each day as students earn team points for showcasing the Edison Fantastic-4 characteristics of: Show Respect, Solve Problems, Make Good Decisions, and Work Hard. Each day as a class, the students also get a chance to earn a “5-Star Day” on a 5 star PE class report. The earning of the five stars is based on Teamwork, Sportsmanship, Positive Attitude, Cooperation, and Following Directions. In addition, individual students, who display the Fantastic-4 characteristics in class, are also acknowledged after each class as “Shocker Students.” “5-Star” classes and “Shocker Students” are recognized in a variety of ways by McFetridge, their classroom teachers, and their classmates.

McFetridge says this about his practice in relation to character development, “My Five Star Practice allows for a safe learning environment, where students feel comfortable in stepping out of their comfort zone. Physical Education can be intimidating, especially with the different ability levels. Every student has their strengths and weaknesses and if we can capitalize on their strengths and build upon their weaknesses, we can help with building confidence in our students. My Five Star Practice helps create an environment where students are able to recognize that no matter what the ability level, all can contribute.”

Principal Josh Wolcott says McFetridge is deserving of this recognition.

“Character development is important to Patrick in his teaching,” Wolcott said. “McFetridge is a “5-Star Teacher” who has established a positive learning environment with his classes that is shown in the way he treats his students and the way they treat each other as they display teamwork, sportsmanship, cooperation, and positive attitudes. “
