Students prepare thousands of meals for children

Project focuses on helping the less fortunate

A slide show of impoverished children from third world countries playing on a big screen on the cafeteria wall set the stage for a global effort at Pioneer Middle School this spring. Volunteer students and families lined cafeteria tables to package meals of rice, chicken and beans for shipment to Africa, the Dominican Republic and Haiti.

The project is linked to the Children of the Nation organization (http://www.cotni.org/) which helps feed the world's hungry children. This volunteer effort produced approximately 8,800 meals. Earlier this school year, Pioneer students organized a candle sale to pay for the food supplies.

A truck from Children of the Nations came from Seattle with all the packaging materials needed for the project. Pioneer PTA President Holly Carrera organized the event. She said the focus of the project was to help Walla Walla students understand the world's vast needs by making a difference for children living in extreme poverty.

"It makes me feel like I'm doing something bigger than me. We're feeding a lot of people. They are less fortunate than we are so we should appreciate all that we have because they are starving and we're not."

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

Astronaut's message: Follow your dreams

Melvin asks parents to support their children along the journey



NASA Astronaut Leland Melvin eats lunch with Green Park Elementary students as part of his visit to Walla Walla earlier this year. Melvin, who has been to space twice on the Space Shuttle and spent time in the International Space Station, tells students to follow their dreams. Melvin challenged students to commit to doing their best, listen to their parents and excel in school.

Melvin was a stand-out football athlete at the University of Richmond and was drafted by the Detroit Lions. A leg injury cut his professional football opportunities short, so he decided to further pursue his love of science. He enrolled in the University of Virginia and eventually earned a master's degree in materials science engineering which helped him land a spot on a scientific research team for NASA.

After spending nearly a decade in research for NASA, he was selected to participate in the Astronaut Candidate Training program. Melvin logged more than 565 hours in space during his 2008 and 2009 missions. He said one of the most rewarding aspects of being an astronaut is visiting schools and talking to children.

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District trims 2010 budget

The district is feeling the impact of the state's \$2.8 billion budget shortfall. Legislative action taken this spring reduced district funding by \$1.2 million for next school year.

The district has developed a budget savings plan for 2010-11 to balance the \$62 million general fund. The plan includes cutting three administrative positions, reducing through attrition one teaching position at Garrison Middle School, trimming school supplies funds and reducing staff professional development dollars. The district will also carry an 8% fund balance reserve to help offset future state cuts.

"This plan has limited the impact on district academic and extra-curricular programs and no permanent staff will lose their jobs," Superintendent Rich Carter said. "We are increasing our fund balance to protect the district's future interests in light of state revenue forecasts which indicate a continued economic downturn in the next biennium."

Walla Walla Public Schools is reorganizing its administrative team to cut costs in the wake of state funding cuts to public education.

In all, the administrative reorganization plan will eliminate three administrative positions netting a 7.5 percent administrative cut.

Changes as a result of the district's administrative reorganization plan will take effect for the 2010-2011 school year.

State matching dollars fund project



New online computer program provides instant student data

The district recently launched OASIS: Online Access to Student Information Systems. This program, developed under the leadership of Assessment Director **Ron Higgins**, creates an online data storage site.

OASIS updates student demographic data daily. In addition, OASIS also stores student pictures, lists of special programs by which the student is served, student attendance data, schools attended, teachers, classes taken, and student assessment data.

"Ready online access to student, classroom, school-wide, and district-wide data places pertinent data and information in the hands of those who can use it immediately to make informed instructional decisions," Higgins said. "With this new tool, users do not need to be 'experts' in knowing about every assessment that may be given to a student to make informed instructional decisions."

The navigation and use of this web-based application is intuitive and displays information in both easy to understand graphs as well as detailed tables of data, according to Higgins. The district worked with Miriam Technologies, Inc. to develop OASIS. Miriam's president is **Ken Treis**, a graduate of Walla Walla Public Schools. Over the past two years, Treis helped the district create a customized data warehouse which specifically met the unique needs of Walla Walla Public Schools.

"He has an uncanny skill to take complicated and challenging concepts and make them reality in a computer application," Higgins said. "Finding a way to successfully capture, store, and display student data online has been an area of interest for at least 10 years."

Higgins said the district will continue to refine the program and offer staff training to best utilize this new tool.






