

Bieloh leads renovation of Fletcher Team Room

Nearly 20 years ago, former Walla Walla Athletic Director **Bill Bieloh** organized the creation of the Fletcher Team Room and Blue Devil Athletic Hall of Fame in honor of legendary football coach Felix Fletcher. Tucked away on the second floor of Walla Walla High School's main gym, the Fletcher Team Room is a place to honor the past and help today's athletes excel through team meetings and film study sessions.

Two decades of use and ever changing technology pushed Bieloh to help modernize the room to meet today's needs. Bieloh reached out to his alumni contacts, including **Mike Murr**, to help fund the \$35,000 renovation.

The original Blue Devil Athletic Hall of Fame plaques were also returned to the Fletcher Team Room and replicas will be featured in the main gym lobby.

Fletcher coached at Wa-Hi from 1947 to 1970. His win/loss record at Wa-Hi was 162-45-10. He had undefeated seasons in 1952, 1956 and 1963. His teams had seven seasons with only one loss. Fletcher taught physical education and was the school's athletic director for more than 20 years.

"Felix Fletcher was our mentor. He taught all of us so much about the psychology of coaching and the importance of maintaining athletic traditions and history. We want to pass on his passion for the game to today's coaches and athletes."

Bill Bieloh, former district teacher, coach, athletic director and personnel director, organized a \$35,000 fundraising effort to modernize the Fletcher Team Room at the Walla Walla High school main gym. This space will be used by coaches and student-athletes for game preparations and special events.

Upgrades funded by alumni donations include a 60" video screen, new chairs for film reviewing sessions and new tables for note taking and electronic equipment.

Chamber endorses Levy

The Walla Walla Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors has voted to endorse the district's Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy which will appear on local ballots February 14, 2012. Rates for the replacement levy are similar to those currently being collected. Levy funding makes up approximately 20% of the district's General Fund budget.

City support helps improve school zone safety

City offers extra patrols and grant support

Walla Walla Public Schools continues to collaborate with parent volunteers and city and county officials to improve school zone safety. The effort began last school year with the formation of the *Safe Travels Alliance* led by volunteers **Katie Christianson** and **Kathryn Southwick Hess**.

This year the team was strengthened with the addition of **Ki Bealey** - City Public Works Director, **Dennis McKee** - City Police Traffic Patrol Captain, **Dan Johnson** - Facilities Support and Operations Director, **Steve Olson** - Transportation Director and district principals. The project falls under the umbrella of the district's Safe Schools program chaired by Communications Director **Mark Higgins**.

The School Zone Safety Team focused on Berney Elementary this fall. Changes include parking lot revisions, relocation of all school buses to a designated lane, designating the front of the school for parent drop-off and pick-up, and tree trimming to improve visibility. Bealey also secured a \$15,000 grant to install two flashing school zone signs near Berney. The signs will be installed this school year on School Avenue and Pleasant Street.

The team is now studying Pioneer Middle School

and Edison Elementary. All district schools will be reviewed this school year. Transportation Director Steve Olson will use this team to develop safe pedestrian travel routes for each school and help make walking to school safer.

School to start after Labor Day

School board members recently approved 2012-13 and 2013-14 school calendars concluding a three month adoption process led by Superintendent **Mick Miller**.

Miller chaired a broad-based committee of 22 people representing staff, students, parents and community. The group reviewed former calendars and potential new calendars and set priorities. - First day of school after Labor Day
- Spring Break first full week of April
- Thanksgiving Holiday (2.5 days off)
- Winter Break (10 business days off)
- Federal Holidays off (except Columbus Day)
- Two professional days annually (Fall/Spring)

Reser Road opens for public use

The \$2.2 million construction project to improve Reser Road from Howard to Fern Streets is completed and reopened for public use. Culbert Construction Inc. of Pasco began construction August 9 and finished on budget and on schedule, according to Aaron Grimm, Walla Walla County Project Engineer.

Street striping for the center line, bike lanes, and cross walks will be completed in the spring as weather permits. The Reser Road improvement project included widening the roadway, sidewalks on both sides of the street, improved school zone safety signage, a new Yellowhawk Creek bridge, bike lanes, additional parking, a new crosswalk at Costello St., stormwater swales, new fencing, and street lighting at the three main intersections.

"We appreciate the patience and understanding from the school district and community throughout this project," said Grimm. "The development and growth to the south of the community has significantly increased traffic on Reser Road and this project will help improve safety and travel efficiency for all modes of transportation."

The project also netted a \$330,000 Safe Routes to School grant to enhance school zone safety awareness, fund equipment and signage and allow for additional law enforcement.

Gobel reveals childhood discrimination

This fall, Pioneer Middle School Principal **Mira Gobel** was named the keynote speaker for the International Education Week Forum 2011 - *Courage Beyond the Borders* event at Whitworth University in Spokane, WA. Gobel shared her story as a Korean, biracial individual who faced discrimination in Korea and eventually journeyed to the United States.



The forum was designed to promote a greater understanding of international issues related to teacher education and the appreciation of other cultures. International Education Week is an international celebration of different cultures in our world and promotes education about these different cultures.

"I was truly honored to be invited to such an amazing event to share my personal story," Gobel said. "I want to share that hope is the fuel that keeps the fire of courage burning. This same hope is what I try to cultivate in students every day."

Gobel is currently in her first year as Principal of Pioneer Middle School. Mira has been an educator for the past 23 years - 15 years as a classroom art teacher and eight as an administrator. She began her career as an art teacher at Pioneer Middle School in the late 1980s.

Blue Ridge Elementary earns way off lowest achieving schools list

State Superintendent **Randy Dorn** recently released the names of schools on the lowest achieving list and this year Blue Ridge Elementary was left off the list.

Last year Walla Walla Public Schools was informed Blue Ridge Elementary was on the list of low-achieving schools based on federal performance criteria linked to state assessment scores over the past three years.

The list is composed of the five percent of schools receiving or eligible to receive federal Title I funds that are identified as the "persistently lowest achieving schools" in the state. In 2011, 57 schools from 38 districts were identified.

Based on Blue Ridge's inclusion on the lowest achieving schools list in 2010, Blue Ridge developed an improvement action plan. The results have been highly visible.

Blue Ridge Elementary School's state assessment scores on the Measurement of Student Progress soared following the Spring 2011 testing cycle. Blue Ridge improved its math, reading and writing scores and posted the top scores in 5th grade science in the district. Blue Ridge has more than 90 percent of its students living in poverty and most come to school with English as their second language.

Whitman College students take civil rights lessons into district classrooms

Whitman College, in partnership with the Southern Poverty Law Center and Walla Walla Public Schools, is coordinating the *Whitman Teaches the Movement* initiative to enhance civil rights education for Walla Walla students in grades 2, 5, 7 and 11 to coincide with Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

Whitman College students, working in small groups, will travel to Walla Walla Public Schools in January to lead one-hour lessons on civil rights education. The lessons are age appropriate and based on curriculum developed by the Southern Poverty Law Center, history teachers and organizations which specialize in teaching history. This project is organized by Whitman College’s Student Engagement Center.

Student Lessons by Grade Level:

- Second Grade: Greensboro lunch counter sit-ins
- Fifth Grade: Jackie Robinson
- Seventh Grade: Women in the civil rights movement
- Eleventh Grade: *Dr. King’s Letter from Birmingham Jail*

Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy

Election Date

- Election date: Tuesday, February 14, 2012
- Ballots mailed: Friday, January 27, 2012
- 50% + 1 vote required for approval
- Four-year levy

The voter-approved 2008 Replacement Levy expires in December 2012 and this levy would replace it. An Educational Programs and Operations Levy is a local property tax, authorized by voters for a period of time of not more than four years, to be used for the instructional and related support program costs in the General Fund of a school district.

The state funds approximately 72 percent of the district’s General Fund budget for Walla Walla Public Schools. Thus, the school district depends on local funding for about 18 percent of the General Fund budget. The remaining portion comes from the federal government and other miscellaneous sources.

Replacement Levy Amount

The proposed levy will cost taxpayers about the same per thousand as was approved by voters in 2008. This proposal is for a replacement of the existing levy.

- 2013 - \$10,227,450 (projected rate \$3.64 per \$1,000)
- 2014 - \$10,483,136 (projected rate \$3.70 per \$1,000)
- 2015 - \$10,745,215 (projected rate \$3.75 per \$1,000)
- 2016 - \$11,013,845 (projected rate \$3.81 per \$1,000)

These rates are based on per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Cost to property owners

The proposed levy amounts are similar to what property owners are currently paying.

Value of Home	2012 Amount Paid	Proposed Replacement Amount for 2013
\$175,000	\$628.25	\$637
\$250,000	\$897.50	\$910

Critical Funding Source

This proposed Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy would help maintain the current level of teaching and educational programs. This proposed Replacement Levy impacts nearly all aspects of district programs and services by funding nearly 20 percent of the district’s General Fund.

Local Economic Impact

Walla Walla Public Schools is a strong driver in the local economy. This replacement levy infuses approximately \$10 million into the school district annually. Most of these dollars are spent locally by the staff and district.

- Pays for specialists not funded by the state (PE & Music)
- Funds all extra-curricular activities (music, sports, drama, FFA)
- Voters approved a similar levy in 2008
- Levy dollars help employ more than 100 staff
