## Green Park embraces trauma sensitive approach



Each year, more students are coming o school with a long list of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)\*. Research reveals staggering proof childhood trauma has an impact on the ability to learn. Green Park Elementary s being proactive by taking steps o better support students living in

Staff conduct weekly lessons at Gina Yonts all grade levels through the social/

emotional learning curriculum Second Steps and Steps to Respect. They also plan daily classroom meetings to build community and sense of belonging. The entire staff participated in studies on *Help for Billy*, by Dr. Heather Forbes and *Managing* Emotional Mayhem, by Dr. Becky Bailey. Green Park has implemented Conscious Discipline (consciousdiscipline.com) practices in K-3 grade classrooms. Conscious Discipline teaches educators to respond to daily conflict by transforming it into a learning opportunity.

"We have seen a reduction in out-of-school suspensions, due to behavior and misconduct," said Principal Gina Yonts. "We are looking at the disruption as something that is stress driven and are trying to identify the stressors so we can help."

Green Park is also focused on the reinforcement of PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) school-wide. Kindergarten through second grade classrooms have worked intentionally on selfregulation strategies to help children learn the skills of self-calming and problem solving, according to Yonts. Conflict mediation to assist with students having a voice and being able to help be a part of solving problems with their peers is stressed in grades three to five. Strides are being made to have teams in place to support the development and implementation of a support plan for struggling students to be successful in school.

"We established Student Success Room space that is comfortable," said Yonts. "We have different lighting to encourage students to remain calm. problem-solve, relieve stress."

Green Park is doing its part to adjust to a changing world so all students have the necessary support to be successful.

"He received this award because of his unselfish contributions to the citizens of Walla Walla in volunteer and civic affairs," said Cummins.



## Winter update...

#### 2016 Replacement Levy

Voters will be asked to consider renewing the district's Educational Programs and Operations Levy February 9. This is not a new tax, but a continuation of local operating funds for the district. Voters approved the 2012 levy by nearly 65 percent. The voter approved 2012 levy expires in December 2016 and this levy would replace it. Proposed rates to taxpayers are similar to those approved in 2012.

#### **Facilities Committee**

The district is also continuing to study its facilities under the leadership of local business owner Paul Schneidmiller and Executive Director of Business Services Ted Cohan. They are identifying priorities and studying costs. The district will not take a bond proposal to the community this school year. Our goal is to have a long-range plan developed by the end of the school year.

#### **Superintendent Search**

The search for a new superintendent is well underway. The position closes Jan. 28. Semifinalist interviews will be conducted in February with finalist interviews scheduled for March. The public will have opportunities to attend and share their feedback.

The replacement levy on the ballot Feb. 9 funds approximately 20 percent of the district's General Fund budget. This percentage includes more than \$3 million in Levy Equalization dollars the district would not receive if the levy did

## Hollywood costume creator finds peace helping students

Laurie Haluska is inspired to teach underprivileged students how to sew. Growing up in an abusive family and losing her brothers to substance abuse and suicide, Laurie turned her attention to beginning an afterschool sewing and costuming program. She has been working in the industry for 35 years, including stints on Return of the Jedi, Born on the Fourth of July and Lonesome Dove. Haluska moved to Walla Walla 12 years ago after living in cities across the nation. For many years, she worked out of her in-home design studio. Now she operates at her own professional studio, Laila Design, near downtown Walla Walla. This is the site of her afterschool program where she took the lead in helping Lincoln High School students design their costumes for the school's award winning Star Wars parade entry. She is also assisting with the costumes for Lincoln's spring play "Alice in Wonderland."

"Even if the kids don't want to do this for a living, it's a creative art form that can give them fulfillment and fun," Haluska said. "My goal is to make this program available to any kids who want or need it, regardless of their ability to pay."

Haluska set-up a fundraiser through You Caring.com to help fund her afterschool program. Thus far she has raised more than \$8000.

"So many of us are shaped by the tragedies we have experienced," Haluska said. "And the service that we later actively do, as a way of giving back to life, comes from the deepest heartbreaks."

## No changes to Wa-Hi schedule

The Sleep Study Committee will not bring a recommendation for a later start at Walla Walla High School following months of study. The group was studying an option to start first period at 8:30 a.m. and end school at 4 p.m. Currently first period begins at 7:30 a.m. and school is out at 3 p.m.

"We discovered clearly during this process at least 50 percent of our

students already start their day at 8:30 a.m." said Executive Director of Business Services Ted Cohan who chaired the committee. "The tremendous community support we have allows us to offer a seven period day at Wa-Hi and much more flexibility in scheduling classes.

Nearly 1400 people completed the survey asking what schedule was preferred. Approximately 70 percent wanted the schedule to remain the same. The district also held community and staff meetings. The messages against making a change were similar. The primary concerns of changing the schedule centered around less time in the evening for homework, student employment conflicts, extra-curricular activities disruptions and missed class time for those involved in activities.

"It was important to go through this extensive process to determine if this was the right fit for Walla Walla," said Cohan. "We learned the community prefers the current schedule."
