

## Levy approved!

### 67 percent of voters say yes to levy

Walla Walla voters sent a strong message of support for Walla Walla Public Schools yesterday by overwhelmingly approving a four-year replacement Maintenance and Operations levy.

With the 67.13 percent yes vote tallied from the February 3 election, local funding is preserved through 2008. M&O Levy dollars make up approximately 17 percent of the district budget and impact nearly all district programs and operations.

Thanks to all our staff for their efforts to inform the community regarding this essential funding source.

The College Place High School proposal failed to meet the required 60 percent supermajority yes count by receiving just 40.97 percent approval.
