Paine explores moving away from credit system

In a special work session with school board members last night, Alternative Programs Principal **Jeff Weeks** outlined a proposal to change Paine Campus to a standards-based program, a shift from the traditional credits system.

Currently Paine Campus students must earn 22 credits to receive a Walla Walla High School diploma. Under the proposed system, Paine students would demonstrate proficiency in Essential Academic Learning Requirement subject areas and vocational skill areas to meet the defined standards and advance.

Paine students under this model would still be required to meet Washington Assessment of Student Learning benchmarks, develop a cul-

minating project and create a fifth year post high school plan, all graduation requirements per the state's Certificate of Mastery.

"We want to create an environment where students take an interest in their learning," Weeks said to board members.

Truman Alternative High School in Federal Way received approval in recent years from the State School Board to develop a standards-based program. Weeks said it currently has a waiting list and all 20 graduates last year pursued higher education.

Paine's proposal will go before school board members in coming weeks. If approved at the local level, it moves on to the State School Board for final consideration.

School Board Meeting Recap • February 17**District updates Strategic Plan**

With the district's first ever Strategic Plan, "Planning for Tomorrow - Today," in its final year, board members approved an extension to allow an additional year to complete important tasks and update the existing objectives to align with various district plans and recommendations.

Deputy Superintendent Judy Reault chaired a team this school year representing the community and staff to refresh the WWPS Strategic Plan using current data and plans.

"Our task was not to recreate the plan, but simply to incorporate the recommendations already established by dozens of people," Reault said. "Understanding that the renewed plan would sunset in June 2005, the team worked to include manageable objectives reflected in the other documents."

All six original WWPS Strategic Plan goals were retained. The objectives and accompanying action strategies were updated. Some objectives and action strategies have been included in this document to be "sustained."

Gear Up Program

College: Not a Dream! It’s a PLAN

Garrison Principal **Jim Sporleder** and Gear Up Site Director **Jerri Doyle** reported to school board members last night progress on the program.

The Gear Up Program, *Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs*, is centered on preparing students to enter and succeed in post secondary education.

Gear Up provides an extended learning program from 3 to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday. Trained tutors provide academic support, during and after school, to help students complete homework assignments, improve motivation and reach higher achievement levels. Students work on academic objectives from 3 to 4 p.m. and then participate in fun activities during the final hour.

Gear Up services were made available through funds from a local/federal matching grant from the Department of Education. Washington State University serves as the grant manager responsible for providing contracted services to Walla Walla Public Schools and several regional school districts.

Doyle said Gear Up also organizes interesting field trips to help hook the kids so they are enthused about participating in the program. Gear Up participants also gain leadership opportunities through community service activities and enhance their technology skills by working with computers.
