## Enrollment up to start school year

As the district prepares for today's first official enrollment count of the 2004-2005 school year, early year indications reveal the district is serving more students than last year at this time, according to a report to school board members last night by Executive Director of Personnel **Bill Jordan**.

Unofficial enrollment tallies from the first week of school rest at 5,814.35 Full-Time Equivalent students and a "head count" total of 6048 students. The following table is a "head count" comparison between 9/3/03 and 9/1/04.

More than 1,000 student projects were on display this year with more than 100 students earning ribbons. Higgins thanked staff fair representatives from each building for decorating the facility and designing the displays. He also recognized staff members for volunteering to take time out of their busy holiday weekend to supervise the Education Building. The Education Building was open from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. each day of the fair.

This year Technology was one of the centerpieces of the Education Building as multimedia, web-based, classwork collections, print, and teacher or class demonstrations projects were judged.

## Summer school provides targeted assistance

District Elementary Summer School Principal **Laure Quaresma** and Blue Ridge Principal **Linda Boggs** briefed school board members on progress made during the latest round of summer school.

Quaresma, who coordinated summer school for Edison, Berney, Prospect Point, Sharpstein, and Green Park at the recently renovated Sharpstein Elementary School, explained to board members how each school used its own instructional model and staff to deliver the program designed to offer targeted reading instruction to students in need.

She said instruction was offered in two hour sessions during the five week summer school program. More than 200 students attended summer school this year from the five schools.

Boggs said the Blue Ridge Summer School model open to all students uses the theme "Core Plus More." She said technology in content areas was a primary focus this summer. Boggs showed creative PowerPoint presentations students designed this summer to demonstrate their skills. She said the students were responsible for doing research, typing the information and mastering the PowerPoint software functions.

## District represented at National Migrant Conference

**Melito Ramirez** reported to school board members on the district's involvement at the National Migrant Program Conference in San Antonio. Wa-Hi students participated in both the state and national conferences.

Ramirez said the conferences were designed to help migrant students gain leadership skills and set goals. Ramirez said the district's 145 migrant students are benefiting from conferences like these. He said parent involvement increases as more students develop action plans for their high school experience and beyond. He said education opens doors to opportunity and leadership skills are a key component of this learning process.
