

Board holds work session and meeting at Edison *Parents and staff embrace school's family atmosphere*

School board members took their show on the road last night conducting a public work session and regularly scheduled meeting at Edison Elementary.

Board members have committed to visiting various sites in the coming months to get more input from staff, parents and community members on facilities and academic needs of specific schools.

Several Edison families and staff members attended the Tuesday night work session held in the school gym. One common theme heard over and over was the desire to maintain a small, neighborhood school which helped personalize learning.

Board members heard Edison has a unique charm that feels more often like a home than a school. Parents said staff not only know the names of their children, but their different personality traits and characteristics.

Despite the charm, most said they like the school's current location and stressed it desperately needs to be re-modeled to better support learning.

Edison serves approximately 264 students of which nearly 70 are open enrolled.

Superintendent **Rich Carter** showed various maps of the community illustrating where Edison families reside. The maps showed many of the families live outside the attendance area boundary.

Carter said enrollment numbers will be a factor school board members will have to consider upon making facilities decisions. Board members committed to coming back to Edison to get more information before making any facilities decisions.

Withycombe reviews Edison School Improvement Plan

Edison Principal **Nancy Withycombe** said the school's Improvement Plan will continue focusing efforts on improve reading, writing and math student achievement levels.

Withycombe said staff have committed to collaborating each Wednesday for one hour. Staff are also working to improve student reading levels by this spring and put more emphasis on math computation skills. She thanked staff for their hard work and professionalism.

Thanks to technology being integrated into their classrooms, Pioneer and Garrison Middle School students can observe an eclipse without ever leaving their campus.

Pioneer Science Teacher **Den-nis Bennett** and Garrison Science/Explorers Teacher **Shannon Ahrens** demonstrated the new Starry Nights software program during a special program to board members.

This truly amazing software program is designed to help students improve astronomy skills through self-paced discovery and brilliantly detailed graphics.

Bennett and Ahrens said this program clearly demonstrates the district's positive efforts to integrate technology into district classrooms.

The Starry Nights project was

made possible thanks to technical support and funding from the district's Technology Department.

Technology Director **Janis Barton** said this project is linked to her department's technology plan which hinges on using current and future technology to improve student achievement. Barton praised Bennett and Ahrens for their vast computer skills and desire to integrate technology into their classrooms. She said they are team players who demonstrate how working together can enhance learning opportunities for students.

Board members were in awe of the details of the program. Students are able to scan the solar system, study moon phases and travel to other parts of the world to track the sun, moon and other aspects of astronomy.

Earlier this fall Edison Elementary students collected *Pennies for Power* to help with hurricane relief efforts in Florida.

Last night 5th grade students from the school's leadership council and 1st grade students from **Kit Chryst's** class reported to school board members on the project. They explained how they designed special collection buckets for the project.

School Board President Tim Donaldson reported on a recent open house at the new *Pathways Back* program at the Juvenile Justice Center.

Pathways Back is a new program designed to help youth under court management resume an educational experience. Former Wa-Hi teacher **Rhonda Olson** serves as the program's classroom teacher.

The program utilizes a portable classroom near the Walla Walla County Juvenile Justice Center. The program is designed to support up to 20 students via a half-day instructional period.

Olson and other Juvenile Justice staff meet regularly with district officials to help identify the needs of the students with an ultimate goal of getting them back into the Walla Walla Public Schools system. Olson encourages people to stop by and learn more about the program.
