Board approves Transportation Cooperative

School board members last night approved a resolution authorizing Walla Walla Public Schools to establish and serve as the host of the Southeast Washington Transportation Cooperative.

The move is a legal requirement for the district to continue efforts to submit a proposal to the state for potential funding of the facility to operate a regional transportation cooperative.

The Southeast Washington Transportation Cooperative helps partner districts save money on school bus maintenance and repair service, improves school bus safety, extends school bus life, and reduces risk liability.

Currently Dixie and ESD 123 have committed to joining the cooperative. Prescott officials will be asked to make a decision during the district's school board meeting next week. Seven area districts, including College Place, have been invited to join.

"With many of our small districts losing students and revenue, it's hard to believe more are not interested in joining," Superintendent **Rich Carter** said. "We'll work with those we have and find ways to cut costs and save our taxpayers money."

State law requires only one district partner to make up a cooperative. Carter is working on a November deadline to submit a proposal to the state. If approved, the state will pay for 90 percent of the facility and the equipment necessary to operate it.

Assessment data leads to improved achievement

District Assessment Director **Ron Higgins** provided a comprehensive report to school board members last night on the district's assessment program.

He stressed the district relies heavily on multiple assessments, including those gener-

ated from district teachers in local classrooms.

He said a team approach is used to understand the information and make recommendations for program placement.

Higgins said technology is also playing a larger role in helping understand assessment results.

District Assessment Philosophy

- Assess and monitor student progress and achievement over time using multiple measures
- Identify the needs of individual students
 - To insure appropriate program placement
 - To insure appropriate interventions
- Determine the effectiveness of instructional programs
