Fast forward seven years and Melgoza, a Class of 2013 graduate, has returned to her beloved former school as the new Wa-Hi ASB Advisor. She also serves in the Equity and Dual Programs Department as a community outreach specialist.

As a junior at Walla Walla High School, she reached out to community leader Lawson Knight to learn how to create a scholarship program by using a Staff/ Student soccer match as the vehicle to raise funds. Knight eagerly agreed and proceeded to train the AVID Club students on the process. In a short time, the group was successful in getting it started.

"In our first year, we awarded two students \$250 scholarships to purchase text books and supplies for college," said Melgoza. "It felt good to do something positive for the school and our peers."

Melgoza was also active in the Latino Club and National Honor Society before moving on to Gonzaga University where she earned a degree in Criminal Justice and Sociology. She recently earned her master's degree from Creighton University in School Counseling and Preventative Mental Health.

Melgoza credits Wa-Hi Intervention Specialist Melito Ramirez as her most influential educator for his continuous encouragement and support.





DELIVERING ON OUR PROMISE

Resiliency on all fronts

Seven months ago our school district, community and state were rocked by COVID-19 when Governor Jay Inslee ordered schools closed indefinitely. Since that directive, a cascade of restrictions, protocols and accommodations have been put in place to help mitigate spread of the virus and keep students and staff safe. While schools have developed vast safety response protocols, no one could have foreseen the pandemic's unilateral impact on our daily operations

We are still learning, adapting and responding to the virus' wake. I could not be more proud of how our staff, students and families have responded. When the virus required us to cancel our traditional graduation exercises, we stepped up to make the events as special as possible for our 400 graduates. When we realized that thousands of students depended on food service, we rose to the challenge to provide over 1,000 meals per day to hungry students. Since June we have served over 170,000 meals! When we realized we would need to start school remotely this fall, we completely overhauled our distance learning experience and developed a brand new Walla Walla Online program to provide another option

I am incredibly pleased how our staff have adjusted to these tremendous challenges, and I am even more proud of how our students and families are responding. No doubt, the impact of campus closures has been extremely difficult. Parents, many who are facing significant financial hardships, have been forced to adjust schedules, arrange for childcare and find creative ways to support their child's education. Students have had to adapt to an online learning model by participating in daily, live sessions while navigating new curriculum and different ways of learning.



Despite these unprecedented obstacles, our families and students are working hard to make the best of this difficult situation. The efforts our students, faculty and families are displaying will ensure our students are prepared and on track when we transition back to in-person learning.

A heartfelt thank you to everyone for coming together during this time of need.

Local contractors land work

This fall's bid openings for Walla Walla High School and Pioneer Middle School renovations continue to spell good news for many Walla Walla businesses. Local contractor Jackson Contractor Group, Inc. followed-up last year's successful bid to be the general contractor for Walla Walla High School as the low bidder for the Pioneer Middle School renovation project. Additionally, many local subcontractors secured substantial portions of the Wa-Hi improvements slated over the next two years.

"In my 20 years of overseeing many large-scale construction projects for multiple districts, this was the greatest turnout and one of the closest bid-day contests I have experienced," said Superintendent Dr. Wade Smith. "We were so delighted to see such great interest from general contractors and even happier to see the project awarded to another firm with a substantial Walla Walla footprint."

Local companies Houk Masonry, Gillespie Roofing, Cutting Edge Plumbing and Jackson Contractor Group, Inc. were some of the low bidders, bringing tens of millions worth of work home to local contractors and vendors.

Bids for both the Pioneer and Wa-Hi improvements, supervised and reviewed by the district's community-led Bond Oversight Committee, came in on budget and in line with estimates. At Wa-Hi, consistent with the phased approach, work will begin immediately on the old science building, the fine arts addition, fitness addition, and culinary, art and pottery improvements. At Pioneer, renovation of the original 1950's wing and core area will be the first addressed.

SEATech Construction students in demand

Jackson Contractor Group is reaching out to SEATech Construction Technology teacher Eric Matson to see if more of his former students are available for hiring following the success of other recent graduates on Jackson's crews.

Jackson Contractor Group has recently hired three SEATech graduates for local and regional work and are looking to hire more carpenters and laborers for the Walla Walla High School and Pioneer Middle School projects and Pasco job sites.

"Of the candidates that I have interviewed, the SEATech students have better interview skills than the rest, hands down," said Project Superintendent Chris Webb. "They also have a good understanding of construction in general and know how to work."

Webb also reports the SEATech students have a tremendous work ethic and are in the company's long-range plans.

"We're hoping to make this a career for them and want them to be part of our family we are building here in Walla Walla," said Webb. "We plan on staying in the community and want them to be a part of our company until they retire."

These projects are prevailing wage government jobs and hourly rates for these positions start at \$32 per hour. Matson is reviewing his list of former students and will stay in communication with Webb regarding potential candidates.

in-picture over a PowerPoint, to writing on the whiteboard, to lecturing in front of the class, to having the kids see what I am looking at in my microscope."

Gordon taught himself how to use Open Broadcaster Software which allows him to post entry tasks and objective statements for all his students to see. He also records his sessions for students who are absent or need more review time. Gordon set up a wall of monitors so he could see all the students in the ZOOM session, watch what he is broadcasting and have access to his own browser for email and other classroom duties.
