


District teams with city and county to enhance law enforcement patrols in district school zones



School Resource Officer Kevin Braman will also participate in additional patrols and student and parent education programs.

With four students being hit by cars this school year on their way to school, Walla Walla Public Schools, the City of Walla Walla and Walla Walla County have teamed to form the Walla Walla Aggressive Drivers Response Team to increase police patrols in school zones.

The program is designed to keep children, parents and staff safe in school zones by creating zero tolerance for traffic infractions in these areas. Walla Walla Public Schools Superintendent **Mick Miller** says forming an alliance between the three organizations will enhance the program's effectiveness as it relates to enforcement, awareness and education.

"We value this partnership as we work collaboratively to keep kids safe in our school zones," Miller said. "We've had four students hit by cars this school year and several near misses and we believe it is important to be proactive when it comes to the safety of our students."

Motorists will see additional police officers on foot, in cars and on motorcycles while driving through school zones at all 10 district schools.

Walla Walla High School students participate in climate change camp

Walla Walla High School students **Yvonne Segovia** (junior) and **Jasmin Llanes-Macias** (senior) reported to school board members on their experience participating in the Cascade Climate Challenge.

The three-week camp challenged the students to learn about the carbon cycle, greenhouse effect and other issues which impact climate change.

Nineteen students from Washington and Oregon participated in the camp sponsored by the North Cascades Institute. The participants hiked in the North Cascades to study actual glaciers to determine how much they have receded over the years.

Segovia and Llanes-Marcias received recommendations from Walla Walla High School staff to earn placement in the program. The students also had to write essays describing why they were a good fit for the program.

They will now be challenged with sharing what they learned with others through an awareness campaign.

Segovia and Llanes-Marcias plan to work with Edison Elementary 5th grade students as part of a science unit. They will also be participating in speaking engagements and preparing presentations for the public.

Both students said the camp experience was life changing and challenged them to grow personally and academically. They said they have more confidence in themselves and are considering career options related to science.
