Explorer student wins national math contest

Prospect Point third grade student **Colleen McKibben** was honored last night for winning the national Continental Math League contest. McKibben tallied perfect scores on all three quizzes. She is in **Lance Longmire's** class as well as enrolled in the Explorer Gifted Learning program taught by **Mary Cortinas**.

Continental Math League is a nationwide mathematics problem-solving competition. Students take three, 30 minute quizzes consisting of six problems. Students are competing with students at their grade level from other schools across the nation.

Fellow Homelink student Jennifer Rau took 2nd place in the VFW history essay contest. Principal Connie Taylor-Randall presented the award.

Homelink offers a great choice for parents

Last night the school board received an annual report on the Homelink program from Principal **Connie Taylor-Randall**.

Homelink is a Parent Partnership Program located at Berney which serves students in grades K-8. Students can either attend classes on campus two days per week or complete their educational hours entirely at home with weekly meetings with their advisory teacher.

Taylor-Randall said the program made great gains this year with plenty to celebrate. She thanked parents and staff for working together to help students learn and grow. She says Homelink is another great choice for parents.

Unfortunately, Taylor-Randall also reported recent state funding formula changes cut revenue by 10 percent or approximately \$200,000 thus negatively impacting enrollment. This year, Homelink served 106 Full-Time Equivalent Students, down 42 FTEs from this time last year.

Highlights this year include partnering with the YMCA, improved student learning plans and enhanced communications tools including brochures and a handbook.
