Winter iReady Update

Walla Walla students and staff efforts lessen impact of COVID-19 pandemic

Last night Assistant Superintendent Chris Gardea provided an overview of iReady Diagnostic assessment data from this year's preliminary results. Students in grades K-8 are being assessed in reading and math during the Jan. 19 through Feb. 19 testing window. Elementary students are taking the exams in person, while middle school students are completing them remotely.

iReady is a comprehensive assessment and instruction program which enables educators to confidently determine each student's on-grade level proficiency based on state and national standards.

Gardea compared Walla Walla Public Schools' data from winter 2020 to winter 2021 as it relates to local historical norms and national performance. He also separated data from subgroups to get a better understanding of how students across the district performed.

He said the results show promise and areas for improvement. In reading, students on-grade level or above met or exceeded the previous year in grades K-1st and 4th-8th. Several grade levels saw a reduction in scoring 2 or 3 grade levels below standards. In math, students in grades kindergarten through 4th grade and 6th-8th outperformed

last year's scores. The data revealed Hispanic and economically disadvantaged students are less likely to be on track to meet grade level standards. This year the number of students three or more grade levels behind in reading and math increased. However, compared to national statistics, Walla Walla students fared better in several grade levels.

"Our staff and students deserve an incredible amount of credit for their performance during the pandemic," said Gardea. "Our students are out performing several grade levels when compared nationally during this unprecedented time."

District planning to address learning loss

Pandemic has impacted achievement across all grade levels

Walla Walla Public Schools, like school districts across the state, is inline to receive federal funds to address learning loss linked to the pandemic.

Last night school board members discussed ideas for summer extended learning and activities programs. Board members said they are willing to think outside the box to get results and gave Superintendent Dr. Wade Smith the green light to begin outreach and planning efforts. Superintendent Smith says a lot of work remains, including engaging staff, students and parents in order to develop programs to meet student learning needs.

Bond Update (February 2021)

Walla Walla High School

Jackson Contractor Group is doing construction on every building on campus except the New Science Building and the Academic Building.

- · Building 1: The roofing work was completed.
- Building 2: HVAC, plumbing, and electrical work continued. Work was initiated to start hanging gypsum wallboard. The new roof dormer features were constructed. New large HVAC mechanical equipment was installed with use of a mobile crane. Work on replacing the windows, doors, and storefronts began as well.
- Building 3: Demolition began inside the existing structure in order to facilitate the remodeling. New utility services were brought to the building addition. The building addition had the foundation trenches dug and prepared for new services and concrete which will be poured soon.
- Building 4: Remodeling of the south portion continued with installation of plumbing, HVAC, IT, and electrical components.
- Building 6: The design team worked on making some additional design changes based on district desires. In addition, the underslab utilities were installed, the subgrade was prepared, and is slab is ready to be poured at the new building segment.
- Building 7: Steel erection was completed and roof framing has been started.
- The design team worked with Jackson to complete and return submittals and answer construction question as they arise in order to facilitate a project that is able to keep up with the schedule.

Pioneer Middle School

- The gym was filled with soil in order to bring the new grade up to the surrounding grade. In addition, grading activities continued in preparation for new foundations and slab on grade.
- The foundations and stem walls were poured at the north side of the commons addition.
- HVAC and electrical work continued in the south wing. Also, the shear walls and new flooring were continued in this wing based on bringing the existing structure up to current codes
- Plumbing of the new locker rooms, the new kitchen, and the new storm water systems were largely completed below grade.
- The design team worked with Jackson to complete and return submittals and answer construction question as they arise in order to facilitate a project and stay on schedule.
