

School Board Meeting Recap | June 4, 2019

Closer review shows high percentage of open enrolled elementary students

Nearly 40 percent of students open enroll

Last night Superintendent Wade Smith reviewed historical boundary changes and reviewed current student attendance per school as part of the school board's Elementary Consolidation Review and Early Learning Expansion study.

The report included data on the total attendance at district elementary schools. It also included the number of open enrolled students and the number of students who walk to school. This close examination of attendance revealed nearly 40 percent of students at district elementary schools are open enrolled and most schools don't have high percentages of students walking to school.

Superintendent Smith is utilizing new software now in place in the Transporation Department for establishing bus routes to pinpoint student household locations. He said this software will be critical for providing data if boundaries are adjusted.

Below is the table Superintendent Smith shared detailing current enrollment data.



"Current attendence data reveals only a small percentage of elementary students are within walking distance to their school. Many choose to open enroll or are transported.

Building Capacity review

School board members also reviewed two scenarios to highlight the capacity implications of repurposing one of the district's elementary schools into an Early Learning Center. One option looked at converting one of the district's largest schools. This scenario would allow for seven general education classrooms for future growth. Converting one of the district's smallest elementary schools would leave 11 classrooms for growth.

CONSENT AGENDA APPROVAL

Early dismissal

Elementary students will have early dismissal Friday to allow time for report card preparations. All students will dismiss early June 12 for the last day of school.

New exclusion MMR law

- Washington state experienced a measles outbreak in 2019 with 81 confirmed cases.
- Based on this crisis, Governor Jay Inslee signed into law a change to the exemption law for the MMR vaccine.
- Personal exemptions to the requirement for two doses of MMR for all students will no longer be accepted as of July 28, 2019.
 There is NO grandfathering clause.
- Medical or religious exemptions are still granted for MMR.
- Personal exemptions are still granted for all other vaccine requirements.
- All WWPS students must have a passing Certificate of Immunization document, or a valid exemption form, signed by a physician, PRIOR to the first day of school or risk exclusion.

Healthy Youth Survey

Walla Walla Public Schools has received results from the Healthy Youth Survey completed last fall by students in grades 6, 8, 10 and 12. Last night Executive Director of Teaching and Learning Christy Krutulis reported on the results. She said the district continues to focus on the social and emotional needs of students as part of Goal 3 of the district's five-year Strategic Plan.

The Healthy Youth Survey data revealed mental health, depression and suicidal thoughts remain prevalent in our society. Krutulis said the district's approach to addressing these issues is to provide support programs and trusting adults to connect with students. She highlighted the Sources of Strength program, Blue Devil Strong Club and Walla Walla County Reach Out program as examples of programs in place to support students. She said the district will ramp up mental health counseling and support.
