#### Girl's Council plans fundraiser at Walla Walla Country Club

Girl's Council is planning a fundraiser at the Walla Walla Country Club Saturday, Oct. 8 from 6 to 9 p.m. to raise money for its project, "The Cottage." Girl's Council is a non-profit organization in Walla Walla which intervenes in the lives of girls ages 9 through 18. It has been operating in the Walla Walla Valley since 2006. Since then, over 200 local girls have been served by our organization.

Girls referred for our program receive training through the Girl's Circle curriculum. Teaching girls to manage their feelings and behaviors by taking charge of their thoughts, empowers them with some of the crucial skills necessary to successfully navigate through life. These groups are run in various community locations as well as within the public school setting.

In addition to providing specialized groups, our goal is to build a residential, ranch-like home for girls in our community in an effort to alleviate the continued risk of physical and emotional harm through residential placement. Once built, "The Cottage" will house up to six girls and will be staffed 24 hours. This home will be a safe place for girls ages 12-17 where they can grow and become empowered within a structured, nurturing environment.

#### Walla Walla High School Football team joins the Fight Against Muscular Dystrophy

Walla Walla High School Varsity Football Coach Eric Hisaw, along with over 500 universities and high schools around the country join Coach to Cure MD in the fight against Duchenne muscular dystrophy. Walla Walla High School is the first high school in the state of Washington to participate. Washington State University is also involved.

Tonight Walla Walla High School will be playing Davis High School at Borleske Stadium at 7:30 p.m. Coaches from both teams will be wearing armbands to show their support for Coach to Cure MD and the fight against this terrible disease. Donations will be gathered throughout the game.

Coach to Cure MD is a partnership between Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy and the American Football Coaches Association. The goal of Coach to Cure MD is to raise national awareness of Duchenne muscular dystrophy and to raise money to fund research for a cure.

Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy is a progressive muscle disorder that causes loss of muscle function and independence which includes decline in respiratory and cardiac function. Boys with Duchenne face loss of mobility and wheelchair dependency. Duchenne primarily affects boys. One boy out of every 3500 live male births will be diagnosed with Duchenne. There is no cure but there is great hope and promising treatments on the horizon. There are boys right here in Walla Walla fighting this terrible disorder.
