District bilingual program meets rigorous achievement standards

Tuesday night district Bilingual Coordinator Diana Erickson reported to school board members the district received notification its Bilingual Program earned "Yes" for all three Annual Measurement of Achievement Objectives (AMAOs). These are the standards by which the state and federal government measure the effectiveness of the bilingual program.

Erickson said the program's success is attributed to many factors including the three tier Response to Intervention model which ensures students' needs are met by monitoring and adjusting instruction. Teachers are utilizing our OASIS data system to effectively monitor student progress and provide instruction based on that data. They also have implemented systematic teaching routines that smooth the transition from Spanish instruction to English instruction.

"We will continue to build on these initiatives to ensure that our English Language Learners continue to acquire proficiency in English and achieve success," Erickson said.

Teachers have worked collaboratively in grade level teams developing units that focus on vocabulary and language structures in all content areas. Dual Immersion programs are being implemented in three elementary schools and one middle school. A co-teaching model is being used at the high school level in which our English Language Learners are integrated with native English speakers for their English class.

The AMAOs are:

- AMAO 1-66.7% of students make adequate progress learning English as measured by the annual Washington Language Proficiency Test II: Walla Walla = 82.9%.
- AMAO 2 13.3% of students transition or exit from program determined by the annual Washington Language Proficiency Test II: Walla Walla 19.6%.
- AMAO 3 Students took the MSP/HSPE and met reading and writing proficiency goals on it: Walla Walla = YES in both cells

Listeria outbreak in cantaloupe not impacting district food services program

Cantaloupe used by the Walla Walla Public Schools Food Service program has not been impacted by the recent listeria outbreak. It is safe to eat. District cantaloupe is coming out of California, according to Food Services of America, the district's produce vendor.

Collaborative investigations by local, state, and federal public health and regulatory agencies indicate the source of the outbreak is whole cantaloupe grown at Jensen Farms' production fields in Granada, Colorado.

From CDC web site:

General recommendations to prevent an infection with Listeria:

FDA recommendations for washing and handling food more safely.

- · Rinse raw produce, such as fruits and vegetables, thoroughly under running tap water before eating, cutting, or cooking. Even if the produce will be peeled, it should still be washed first. Scrub firm produce, such as melons and cucumbers, with a clean produce brush. Dry the produce with a clean cloth or paper towel that has not been previously used before cutting them up.
- · Brushes and peelers should be sanitized after cleaning raw produce.
- · Keep uncooked meats and poultry separate from vegetables and from cooked foods and ready-to-eat foods.

School board members tour Lincoln Health Center

Daily use continues to rise for health center services

Lincoln Health Center Director Holly Howard provided a tour of the facility for school board members before Tuesday night's meeting. Howard says the health center continues to see its usage numbers rise. She said students visit to receive care for illnesses and other medical conditions.

Howard said mental health services and drug related counseling are in high demand. Howard is focused on providing quality services, securing funding, raising awareness and improving communication.

Lincoln High School studies 19 credit diploma

Lincoln High School Principal Jim Sporleder provided a report Tuesday night to school board members during the public work session on the need to offer students meeting defined criteria an opportunity for a 19 credit State of Washington diploma. Currently the district requires all students to earn 22 credits for a diploma.

Sporleder says the exception would only be made for students who are 17.5 years of age, in senior status and who have less than 14 credits. They would also be required to pass all state graduation requirements, including High School Proficiency Exam standards. Sporleder said 25 of the school's current 66 seniors could benefit from this option.

He said many districts offer a similar diploma for select students. Sporleder says this will help keep students in school and not transfer to other out-of-district programs. No decisions were made Tuesday night. The board will continue its study.

Girl's Council plans fundraiser at Walla Walla Country Club

Girl's Council is planning a fundraiser at the Walla Walla Country Club Saturday, Oct. 8 from 6 to 9 p.m. to raise money for its project, "The Cottage." Girl's Council is a non-profit organization in Walla Walla which intervenes in the lives of girls ages 9 through 18. It has been operating in the Walla Walla Valley since 2006. Since then, over 200 local girls have been served by the organization.

Girls referred for the program receive training through the Girl's Circle curriculum. Teaching girls to manage their feelings and behaviors by taking charge of their thoughts, empowers them with some of the crucial skills necessary to successfully navigate through life. These groups are run in various community locations as well as within the public school setting.

In addition to providing specialized groups, the goal is to build a residential, ranch-like home for girls in the community in an effort to alleviate the continued risk of physical and emotional harm through residential placement. Once built, "The Cottage" will house up to six girls and will be staffed 24 hours a day. This home will be a safe place for girls ages 12-17 where they can grow and become empowered within a structured, nurturing environment.

Walla Walla High School students build nesting boxes to attract area birds of prey

Walla Walla High School has teamed with North Slope Management, under the direction of Jon Davies, to build nesting boxes to attract birds of prey such as owls, bats and kestrels. The project is designed to get birds of prey to live near area vineyards to reduce damage to grape vines caused by rodents and bugs. We plan to build nesting boxes and perches that will be placed in the vineyards to attract and house the birds and bats.

"We will then study and observe the bird and pest populations," said Agricultural Education teacher Lindsey Butcher. "The goal is to see less damage on grape vines and control the population of the pests without the use of traps or poisons."

The boxes will be delivered to Seven Hills Winery in Milton Freewater, OR on Sunday October 9 at 11 a.m. Students will also get a tour of the vineyards to make initial observations of native wildlife including the pests and the birds of prey. Paige Montgomery, is the student project coordinator.
