#### Blue Ridge Principal Earns Regional Leadership Award

Walla Walla Elementary school principals in the Lake Wallula Region have selected Blue Ridge Elementary Principal Kim Doepker as one of 18 regional Distinguished Principals for the 2011-12 school year. She will be considered for the state's Distinguished Principal Award. The winner of the state award will serve as the nominee for National Distinguished Principals Program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education and the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP).

"Mrs. Doepker has acted to provide strong interventions and has revamped the structure of the school day to meet the needs of her students. At her school, staff specialize in reading, math, or science as students move from teacher to teacher during the day. She is also adept at providing valuable feedback on lesson design and implementation." said Bruce Cannard, principal, Edison Elementary (Kennewick School District). Cannard is also the Lake Wallula regional director of the Elementary School Principals Association of Washington (ESPAW), the state's professional association for elementary school principals.

"Mrs. Doepker has also led the development of a Dual Language Spanish/English Program that is in its second year of implementation, with plans to eventually carry it through all elementary grades at Blue Ridge."

For the past three years Doepker has been principal at Blue Ridge. She was an assistant principal at Pioneer Middle School prior to her current position. She graduated from the University of Idaho and later earned a masters from Eastern Washington University in Curriculum and Instruction.

"Kim is an innovative thinker with the energy needed to carry out programs leading to student success," said Laure Quaresma, assistant superintendent of Walla Walla School District.

The regional, state and national Distinguished Principals Programs serve to honor exemplary elementary and middle school principals who set the pace, character, and quality of the education children receive during their early school years. One principal is chosen annually from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia. Principals representing private K-8 schools, Department of Defense Dependents' Schools, and the U.S. Department of State Overseas Schools are also recognized.

Public school principals are nominated by peers in their home states, and the final selection for each state's NDP is made by the NAESP state affiliate (ESPAW and the Association of Washington School Principals, in the case of Washington State). Honorees from private schools and overseas schools are selected by special committees.

ESPAW and the statewide principals' association, the Association of Washington School Principals, will formally honor Kim Doepker and the other regional Distinguished Principal candidates at its fall conference next October.

#### Wa-Hi Cadet of the Month earns on-the-spot promotion

The Walla Walla High School JROTC "Blue Devils" Cadet Battalion has selected its "Cadet of the Month" for November 2011 and rewarded his achievement with an immediate promotion. Cadet Private First Class Brandon Latendresse, a 16-year-old 10th grader, was promoted to this new rank after he won the top spot with a total score of 78 points, according to the presiding official on the board.

The top Cadet was selected from three candidates who were inspected and examined in oral interviews by a board of four advanced cadets, according to Lt. Col. Bill Bialozor, Senior Army Instructor for the Walla Walla High School 's Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps program. Latendresse said that he joined JROTC because he plans on joining the Marine Corps and to attend college. He enjoys playing sports and video games, shooting, and fishing.

"His strongest competitive category was His self confidence," said Cadet Command Sgt. Maj. Malachi Matthews. "This Cadet of the Month was a close match and the cadets' performances were outstanding."

First runner up was Cadet Private Dylan Mayeski, a 16 year old sophomore, whose strongest suit was his personal appearance. He came in second with 72 points. Second runner up was Cadet Private Mattie Bialozor, a 14 year old freshman, whose strongest suit was her attitude. She came in third with 68 points.

"After the board tallied the points and the winner was clear, we held a ceremony to promote the winning cadet one rank higher, to recognize him for him hard work and personal success," said Bialozor.

Wa-Hi JROTC cadets participate in the program to develop leadership skills and to strive to be better citizens in society. Many cadets compete as members of drill, marksmanship, and physical training teams as well as attend the class. These cadets get to travel to and compete in drill meets at 16 other schools in the Cascade Division that include Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Navy Cadet programs.

Latino Club students tour WSU athletic facilities and watch football game - By Volunteer Bill Erickson snowy day in Pullman was in store for 30 students from Lincoln High School and the Walla Walla High School Latino Club when they attended the Utah - Washington State game on Saturday, November 19th. With temperatures in the low 20s the students, hosted by the WSU athletic department, watched the Cougars experience a 30 – 27 overtime loss to Utah.

"There is nothing more rewarding than seeing high school students, for the first time, step foot on a college campus," stated Gaby Salazar, who is a volunteer College Counselor at Lincoln High School. "They show up not knowing what to expect, but once they get to see and talk to college representatives they light up."

The students, who arrived on campus early in the day were met by Walla Walla High School graduate and WSU Athletic Marketing Director, Casey Fox who then led the students on a tour of Beasley Coliseum and Bohler Gym. The tour began with the men's basketball locker room and ended, just prior to the team's arrival at the WSU Football locker room set up for the game later in the day. Casey pointed out the importance and recognition of the WSU "brand," especially the WSU logo designed by WSC student Randall Johnson in 1937, which is currently one of the most recognized school emblems in the United States.

After the tour of the Cougar athletics department, a physics demonstration was provided by WSU Physics Department staff member, Tom Johnson. The demonstration included various props and experiments that demonstrated examples of inertia, force, magnetism, and electricity. "The students, from the start of the physics demonstration, were engaged by the mysteries of science. Normally it is intimidating to answer questions at a college level," said Salazar. "These kids instantaneously wanted to shout out their theory on what was happening during each experiment as they were happening." During the presentation, the development of math skills were emphasized as Johnson stated that "the language of physics is math." After the physics demonstration and just prior to the game, the students toured the WSU Multicultural Center.

"These visits help students realize that college is fun and exciting," stated Salazar. "College visits help our students change their minds about just graduating from high school and joining the work force. Instead, they are to wanting to expand their education by attending Walla Walla Community College or a four year university like WSU.

The trip, funded by Lincoln High School and the Wa-Hi Gear Up program, was organized by Boy Scouts Exploring Post 311.

# Debate team travels to Spokane to participate in exclusive event - By Coach Jean Tobin

The weekend of November 18 and 19 the Wa-Hi debate team competed in Spokane at the Central Valley Bear Brawl. I took a smaller team of eight students. The students earned the privilege of attending based on their efforts preparing before the season started and their success at the Whitman tournament.

The reason I chose this tournament for students to attend is because it is a Tournament of Champions qualifying tournament. The Tournament of Champions (TOC) is held once a year and only students that have placed at nationally competitive tournaments are allowed to attend. Students earning 2 "bids" at qualifying tournaments are invited to attend the TOC tournament. The Bear Brawl is one of the few tournaments in our area to offer a bid to the TOC in Congressional Debate so we attended hoping to earn a bid for a Wa-Hi student. Machado Mijiga (senior) was one of 6 students that earned a TOC bid!

He placed 5th in Congressional Debate. We are not sure if Machado will attend the TOC tournament (he can petition to attend based on one bid, because we live in a region which has limited TOC qualifying tournaments) because of the cost and because he is also hoping to qualify for the National tournament. But it is an honor for him to have received the bid and we are very proud of him.

Because we traveled with such a small team, we did not receive enough points to earn a team award, however our students still were very successful. We competed against 17 schools from the Spokane area.

# Civil Rights expert to present: Losing History? State Standards and the Civil Rights Movement

Kate Shuster is the author of a groundbreaking report that assessed the declining attention given to the civil rights era in America's public education. The report received extensive coverage, including a story in the New York Times. This talk is a part of a new initiative between Whitman, the Walla Walla Public School District and the Southern Poverty Law Center's Teaching Tolerance project. The initiative – Whitman Teaches The Movement – is an effort to creatively address some of the challenges pointed out in Shuster's report. This lecture will be useful background for the Whitman Teaches The Movement initiative, a new collaboration between Whitman, Walla Walla Public Schools and the Teaching Tolerance program, that will take place during the week of MLK Day.

Shuster holds a Ph.D. in Educational Studies from Claremont Graduate University with an emphasis in education policy. She is the author of Teaching the Movement: The State of Civil Rights Education 2011, published by the Southern Poverty Law Center. She works as an independent researcher and program evaluator. In addition to her current work on curricular reform, high-stakes testing and evaluation processes, she administers America's largest middle school debating program and coaches the U.S. national high school debate team. She is the author of nine books on debating and critical thinking instruction.

#### Student-based health center launches new name and brand
