Walla Walla Public Schools hosts College and Career Week

Students in grades 6-12 to participate in college visits, ACT testing and academic planning

Walla Walla Public Schools, in partnership with WSU GEAR UP, is offering students an opportunity to begin thinking about college, career choices and their future beyond high school through the EXPLORE, PLAN, and ACT program for students in grades 6-11. Students in grades 8-11 will take the ACT assessment and complete an academic progress report. Students in 6th and 7th grades will participate in local and regional college visits.

"As our teachers and administrators work with students and families in preparation for graduation from high school, we are excited to be hosting a 6-12 College and Career week, providing varied experiences related to information needed to make decisions about post-secondary aspirations," said Dr. Linda Boggs, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction. "Between the activities and the test administration, I believe we are the only district in the state of Washington to offer this comprehensive opportunity for all of our students."

Walla Walla Public Schools is working to develop a more comprehensive college and career plan, aligned with our district Strategic Goals. WSU GEAR UP is a critical partner in this process.

"We know that college and career readiness does not happen during one week of specialized activities, but rather on a daily basis, throughout a student's educational career in Walla Walla," Boggs said.

College and Career Week Overview:

• The EXPLORE helps prepare 8th and 9th grade students for their high school coursework and their post-high school choices. EXPLORE includes four multiple-choice tests covering English, mathematics, reading, and science. EXPLORE assessments have content similar to the PLAN and the ACT.

• PLAN serves as the midpoint check of academic progress in high school. It is designed to improve students' preparation for education, training, and work after high school while they still have time to adjust their high school courses. PLAN has content similar to the ACT.

• The ACT is America's most widely accepted college entrance exam. It assesses high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work. The multiple-choice tests cover four skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science.

"We are very excited that our students will have this opportunity to participate in a nationally recognized assessment which will provide them with extremely useful information to help guide their future decisions regarding careers and college," said Ron Higgins, Walla Walla High School Assistant Principal.

ACT Testing dates:

- Pioneer Middle School (8th grade only): Tuesday, March 13
- Garrison Middle School (8th grade only): Thursday, March 15
- Sager Middle School (8th grade only): Thursday, March 15
- Walla Walla High School (9th, 10th, 11th): Tuesday, March 20

The ACT[®] contains five curriculum and standards-based assessments: English, mathematics, reading, science, and an optional writing test. The assessment is used as a college admissions and placement test and measures the skills and knowledge needed for first-year college success. Additionally, the ACT includes a career exploration component that stimulates students' thinking about future plans and relates personal characteristics to career options. The score reports from all the tests provide comprehensive academic data. These assessments are also excellent career and college advising and academic planning tools for teachers, counselors, and parents.

"We are excited to offer this opportunity to our 8th grade students," said Gina Yonts, Garrison Middle School principal. "We are focused on providing opportunities for all students to create a personal plan for their academic success. The outcomes of EXPLORE testing will allow us to better counsel our students and help them establish plans for their high school and beyond careers!"

Pinewood Derby race wraps up Garrison Night School Extended Day Learning Program

The 10-week Garrison Night School Extended Day Learning Program celebrated its final night with a 30-car pinewood derby sponsored by Exploring Post 311 and the night school. The celebration was for grades K-7 students who participated in the extended learning program.

The race was February 29. Thanks to the assistance from Walla Walla High School Latino Club volunteers. The car made by Gilberto Badillo, an elementary student from Milton-Freewater, placed first; Sharpstein Elementary student Lupita Parra-Garcia, second place; third place was Jose Martinez from College Place.

It is the fifth year the race was held at Garrison Night School and is a partnership between the Walla Walla School District, Walla Walla Community College, Wa-Hi Latino Club, and Exploring Post 311. Fifty-six Latino Club members provided more than 928 hours of service to the program during the four-nights-per-week, 10-week program.

"The help and support of our Latino Club volunteers has been a significant part of our program's success," said Diana Erickson, coordinator of the Extended Day Education Program. "The preschool and grade school students in our programs are not only getting individual tutoring each night, they are also being mentored by outstanding role models who are members of the Wa-Hi Latino Club." Reading, math and vocabulary support was provided to the children of parents who attended the night school.

Volunteers from Wa-Hi Latino Club have supported Garrison Night School Program since 2008. Starting that fall, Exploring Post 311 received a \$3,200 grant from Walla Walla United Way to implement The Estrellita (literacy) Program for pre-school children whose parents attend the Garrison Night School Program. Through the grant, Latino Club members received training so they could help Spanish-speaking pre-schoolers learn their alphabet and letter sounds.

The next year, the program was expanded to provide educational support to all students in the program. Latino Club volunteers provide one-on-one tutoring and presentations to the younger students and help and support the adult programs, also. People of all ages throughout our community benefit from the instruction and activities that Garrison Night School offers.

Berney parent raises \$1500 through firefighter stairclimb event fundraiser

Berney Elementary parent volunteer Tania Nelson recently participated in the 21st Annual Scott Firefighter Stairclimb event at the Columbia Center in Seattle. Nelson joined more than 1,500 firefighters from over 200 different departments in racing up 69 flights of stairs, or 1,311 steps, in full fire gear to help raise money for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS). "This year the honoree was a little girl who passed away, and it was definitely heartbreaking listening to her mom tell her story," Nelson said. "It always gives me something to think about while climbing those 1,311 stairs. I am planning on doing this event again next year!"

Nelson said there is always a lot of encouragement during the event.

"While in the stairwell you are passing other firefighters and some are passing you, but each time you get by another firefighter there is always a high five, pat on the back or some encouraging words, which is something that keeps you going," Nelson said. "There were about five or six of us together toward the top and when we reached the 69th floor we knew that there was only four floors to go. The firefighter in the front of our little group started yelling -- four more floors guys, we can do this, then three more and on and on until we passed 72 then he said last one, finish strong."

Public meeting scheduled Thursday to review changes at Berney aimed at improving safety in the school zone Walla Walla Public Schools has teamed with the City of Walla Walla Public Works Division, city police and parent volunteers from the Safe Travels Alliance to improve school zone safety at Berney Elementary.

The school district is planning a public meeting Thursday, March 22, at 6:30 p.m. in the Berney gym to review changes aimed at improving safety in the school zone. A site map will also be distributed during the meeting detailing the changes. The school zone changes at Berney Elementary will take effect after Spring Break.

Berney School Zone Changes: (changes will take effect after Spring Break)

- Student drop-off and pick-up areas have been expanded to the front of Berney Elementary on Pleasant Street and will continue around the building to the west-side of School Avenue.

- School buses are being relocated to a school bus loop west of the school.

- The parking lot west of Berney is now an "enter only" lot for staff and visitors. Motorists will leave the parking lot using the new one way exit loop.

- The bus lane/car exit area is NOT a student drop-off and pick-up area.
- A new crosswalk is being installed on the north side of Pleasant Street at Sycamore Street.
- Flashing School Zone Speed limit signs will be installed on Pleasant Street and School Avenue.

- City of Walla Walla crews will repaint all crosswalks to improve visibility and curbing to indicate no parking zones.

- Additional signage is being installed to better identify student drop-off and pick-up areas.

Sharpstein Elementary invites community to Celebration of the Arts March 21

Little Pollacks, Matisses and Picassos have been busy this winter at Sharpstein Elementary in preparation for the school's fourth annual Celebration of the Arts. Their creations will be on display Wednesday, March 21 from 6 to 8 pm in the school gymnasium, and organizers welcome members of the community to join the festivities.

"We are excited to bring the Celebration of the Arts to the kids at Sharpstein because it gives them yet another opportunity to awaken their inner artist and create beauty in the world," said Lisa Stott, the event's chairperson. "We would love for members of our community to come and see what we've created."

More than 20 student-created items will be on display and auctioned off during the evening. Third-grade students painted in the style of Jackson Pollack, flinging, splattering and drizzling paint on canvases. First-graders fused nature and art, creating delicate paper mache birds-nest bowls and eye-popping, whimsical birdhouses. Encouraged to "draw with scissors," second-graders fashioned a large-scale paper leaf collage in the style of Henri Matisse. Fifth-grade students painted original 4x6 pieces, acrylics on heavy paper, that were combined together into one eye-catching work of modern-abstract art. One of the more unusual projects was spearheaded by parent Scott Caldwell, who worked with Sean Reid's fifth-grade students to create a three-dimensional dragon head.

"My goal was to help them discover possibilities in art that they might otherwise think was beyond them," said Caldwell. "Through the Picture Lab program (formerly Picture Lady), I have had many opportunities to work with Sharpstien students over the years and I knew I had some really talented kids to work with, also it is the Chinese year of the Dragon. With all that in mind, I proposed to the class a more advanced project that would really challenge them."

The dragon head is actually made from card stock paper pieces that had to be meticulously cut out with a very high level of precision and accuracy. Once cut, each piece had to be scored to ensure accurate folding and then finally inspected before the piece could then be added to the model. There were a total of 193 individual parts printed on 47 sheets of card stock. The class worked over the course of three days to cut out all of the pieces with every student taking part, including teacher Sean Reid.

Once the dragon was assembled, Caldwell asked the students to come up with their ideas for paint schemes and with those he tried to incorporate the varying styles into the final painting. (A poster of the students' concept art work will also be available for auction). Finally, they added some LED lights to the head and a display stand made from oak and galvanized pipe. The finished dragon head stands 20 inches tall and 29 inches long.

"I have to say that this was an incredibly rewarding project to be part of," said Caldwell. "I know whoever wins the dragon head at this year's auction will be acquiring not just an amazing conversational piece but also an inspiring sculpture that showcases the amazing heights that children can achieve through art."

All artwork will be auctioned to raise funds for the Sharpstein PTA. Family-friendly packages and gift certificates from local merchants like the Walla Walla Sweets, the Sweet Putt, Walla Walla Clothing Company, and Bright's will also be available through a silent auction.

Sharpstein teachers have also gotten into the spirit, offering "adventure packages" for students and their families to bid on fun activities hosted by teachers that include bowling, pottery painting, baking cookies, a Wii tournament, a Sweets game, a "spa" day and more.

In addition to art displays and silent auction items, guests will be treated to musical performances and light refreshments. All are welcome and invited to come!

Through the prism of *The Seattle Times*, and illustrated by the Pulitzer Prize award-winning work he managed, David Boardman will discuss what the act of professional journalism requires and marrying the use of modern tools and "citizen journalism" with traditional values.

Boardman serves as Executive Editor of The Seattle Times and <u>seattletimes.com</u>. He has oversight and responsibility for the news department of Washington State's largest newspaper and for its website, <u>seattletimes.com</u>. As an editor for The Times, David has directed three Pulitzer Prize-winning team projects and edited six other stories that were Pulitzer finalists. As a member of the company's senior executive team, David contributes to overall company operations, strategy and long-term planning. Before joining The Times in 1983, David was a reporter and editor at several papers in the Northwest, and worked on a construction project in Liberia, West Africa. He is a graduate of the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University and has a graduate degree from the University of Washington.

About The Hosokawa Lecture Series: In 2000, an endowed lectureship was established at Whitman College by David and Beverly Hosokawa, and the Hosokawa Family Foundation. Intended to be a celebration of journalistic excellence, the lectureship honors Robert R. Hosokawa, David's father, by bringing a noted journalist to campus. The endowment also established the Hosokawa Prize to be awarded each year in recognition of outstanding achievement and excellence as demonstrated by student journalists and photojournalists of The Pioneer. A Whitman Alumnus of Merit, Class of 1940, Robert Hosokawa was a reporter for several papers in Missouri, New York, Iowa and Minnesota. He held journalism professorships at the University of Missouri and the University of Central Florida and has been a mentor to many young journalists.
