Former Pioneer Middle School teacher receives Washington State Middle Level Principal of the Year Award

Kenny Renner-Singer, principal at Icicle River Middle and Beaver Valley Elementary schools in Leavenworth (Cascade SD), is this year's Washington State Middle Level Principal of the Year. Renner-Singer began his career as a language arts and social studies teacher at Pioneer Middle School in 2000. In addition to his teaching duties, in 2003 he also took on the role of administrative intern and spent time as acting assistant principal at Pioneer.

Renner-Singer was named this year's Middle Level Principal of the Year by the Association of Washington School Principals (AWSP). A panel of principals representing the Association of Washington Middle Level Principals, a component of AWSP, selected him from a pool of regional finalists.

The selection committee said it was Renner-Singer's work producing "significant student achievement gains" that tipped the award in his favor. Renner-Singer, who has served as principal of Icicle River and Beaver Valley schools since 2005, encouraged his staff to question everything. They pored over reams of student achievement data and determined focus areas. He helped teacher teams develop content-area learning targets, benchmark assessments and interventions for struggling and accelerated students. As a result of adding new enrichment programs for accelerated students, 8th-grade math scores skyrocketed from 63.5 percent in 2005-2006 to 90.4 percent in 2009-2010.

Another area Renner-Singer focuses on is hiring. He carefully selects new hires to fit grade-level and content-area teams and the overall culture of the school. He also places a strong emphasis on national board certification and teacher participation in leadership roles at the local, regional and national levels. As a result of this focus, Renner-Singer has seen direct gains in student achievement:

Debate coach praises students

Walla Walla High School Debate Coach Jean Tobin (Green Park teacher) reported to the school board Tuesday night on the team's successful season. The meeting was also an opportunity to celebrate Junior Hope Grant-Herriot's state championship.

Hundreds of students from around the state packed the University of Puget Sound campus for the state tournament. Hope placed first in Oratory becoming Wa-Hi's first State Champion in Speech and Debate. Hope's speech was centered on the issue of obesity and its physical and emotional impacts.

Tobin praised all the students on the Debate Team for their efforts. She also thanked the district. She said the debate students are talented and put in the effort and hard work necessary to be successful. Hope will now advance to the national debate tournament.

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District's Response to Intervention practices receive national praise

The U.S. Department of Education has approved Walla Walla Public Schools's participation in the Evaluation of Response to Intervention Practices for Elementary School Reading. To be eligible for the study, schools experienced in implementing RtI practices in early reading were nominated by national experts as a possible site for this study. The following schools have been approved for participation in the study:

- Sharpstein Elementary
- Prospect Point Elementary
- Edison Elementary
- Blue Ridge Elementary
- Berney Elementary

The evaluation study will address the following questions:

- 1. What are the effects of intensive secondary reading interventions on academic achievement for children in elementary school who have been identified as being at risk for reading difficulties?
- 2. How do academic outcomes, including reading achievement and special education identification, vary with elementary schools' adoption of RtI practices for early grade reading?
- 3. How do RtI practices for early grade reading vary across schools?

These practices must have been in place in first grade no later than 2009-10 and include:

- universal screening (benchmarking) administered in reading at least two times a year to all students;
- at least three levels (tiers) of instruction, comprising a system of increasingly intensive interventions;
- monitoring the progress of students who do not meet benchmark;
- evaluating student's performance and response to interventions using these data; and
- making decisions based on these data for tier placements.

Information gathered during the site selection process and any subsequent data collection is confidential and will be used only for broadly descriptive and statistical purposes. The reports prepared for the study will summarize findings across the sample and will not associate responses with a specific district or individual.

Middle School students have strong showing at Odyssey of the Mind

Teams of students from Garrison and Pioneer Middle School made the long trek to Garibaldi, Ore.last weekend to participate in the Odyssey of the Mind competition. One hundred thirteen students from Pioneer and Garrison attended the competition The bus trip was seven hours.

Odyssey of the Mind is an international educational program that provides creative problem-solving opportunities for students from kindergarten through college. Team members apply their creativity to solve problems that range from building mechanical devices to presenting their own interpretation of literary classics. They then bring their solutions to competition on the local, state, and world level. Thousands of teams from throughout the U.S. and from about 25 other countries participate in the program.

"The kids had a great time and the adults survived!" Pioneer Explorer teacher Dan Calzaretta said. "In addition, we received numerous compliments from the camp director, Odyssey coordinator, and competition volunteers about the attitude, behavior, and friendliness of our students."

Prospect Point preparing Safe Routes to Schools education plan

Prospect Point Principal Chris Gardea reported to school board members Tuesday night on the education plan he is developing to meet the requirements of the Safe Routes to Schools grant.

Walla Walla County received nearly \$400,000 through this grant to help fund improvements to Reser Road. One component of the grant is to create an education plan to raise awareness on safety issues and encourage more students to walk or ride their bikes to school. Gardea has a \$16,000 budget via the grant to complete the plan. The education plan features tv and radio public service announcements, posters, web enhancements and a bike rodeo scheduled for Saturday, April 28 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon at the Prospect Point parking lot.

Gardea will also introduce the *Boltage* program to the school which helps track the frequency of students walking and riding bikes to school. Safe Travels Alliance Co-Chair Katie Christianson is working with Gardea to establish a "walking school bus" program. This concept features a parent volunteer escorting children to school on a routine basis. The timeline for the education plan is mid-April to mid-September.

World War II concentration camp survivor meets with Lincoln High School students

This week World War II concentration camp survivor Willem Houwink was the keynote speaker at the Lincoln High School assembly. Houwink was a political prisoner at Dachau for three years. He entered the camp at the age of 22. Opened 22 March, 1933 (51 days after Adolf Hitler took power), Dachau was the first regular concentration camp established by the coalition government of National Socialist Party (Nazi Party) and the German National People's Party (dissolved on 6 July 1933).

Heinrich Himmler, Chief of Police of Munich, officially described the camp as "the first concentration camp for political prisoners." Dachau concentration camp was located on the grounds of an abandoned munitions factory near the medieval town of Dachau, about 9.9 miles northwest of Munich in the state of Bavaria, which is located in southern Germany.

Houwink was a spy for the Dutch. He was turned into authorities by female of the NAZI party. He is considered one of the top 29 expert economists in the world with expertise on China. Lincoln High School students were moved by the presentation.

"It was very educational and eye opening," said Joel Galan. "I am not sure how we, as human beings, can do those things to someone else. It was horrible!"

"It was very touching to the heart to hear his story," said Ashley Mace. "It is amazing to me that someone can live through that."

Walla Walla High School ranks in top 10 for financial aid applications submitted

Whitman College public lecture: "The Promises and Perils of Journalism in the 21st Century"

Through the prism of *The Seattle Times*, and illustrated by the Pulitzer Prize award-winning work he managed, David Boardman will discuss what the act of professional journalism requires and marrying the use of modern tools and "citizen journalism" with traditional values.

Boardman serves as Executive Editor of The Seattle Times and <u>seattletimes.com</u>. He has oversight and responsibility for the news department of Washington State's largest newspaper and for its website, <u>seattletimes.com</u>. As an editor for The Times, David has directed three Pulitzer Prize-winning team projects and edited six other stories that were Pulitzer finalists. As a member of the company's senior executive team, David contributes to overall company operations, strategy and long-term planning. Before joining The Times in 1983, David was a reporter and editor at several papers in the Northwest, and worked on a construction project in Liberia, West Africa. He is a graduate of the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University and has a graduate degree from the University of Washington.

About The Hosokawa Lecture Series: In 2000, an endowed lectureship was established at Whitman College by David and Beverly Hosokawa, and the Hosokawa Family Foundation. Intended to be a celebration of journalistic excellence, the lectureship honors Robert R. Hosokawa, David's father, by bringing a noted journalist to campus. The endowment also established the Hosokawa Prize to be awarded each year in recognition of outstanding achievement and excellence as demonstrated by student journalists and photojournalists of The Pioneer. A Whitman Alumnus of Merit, Class of 1940, Robert Hosokawa was a reporter for several papers in Missouri, New York, Iowa and Minnesota. He held journalism professorships at the University of Missouri and the University of Central Florida and has been a mentor to many young journalists.
