The Walla Walla High School Debate Team will conduct a mock Presidential Debate at the Wa-Hi Auditorium on Saturday, October 27 at 7 p.m. This event is open to the public. A suggested donation of \$5 per person will be collected to help fund the Debate Team.

There will be two teams of debaters: A team supporting Romney's positions and a team supporting Obama's positions. The teams will alternate presenting the candidates' perspectives on different issues, such as the economy or foreign policy. The candidate representatives will have a chance to question each other.

"Audience members will vote to give a prize to the strongest speaker on each team, which team they thought did the best overall and finally, who they think should be the President of the United States," Debate Coach Jean Tobin said.

# Pioneer Middle School teacher and parent volunteer plan trip to China for training

Pioneer Middle School teacher Dan Calzaretta and parent volunteer Kathryn Southwick Hess are traveling to Beijing, China next month to receive training on the Education First Student Travel program. The trip is paid for by Education First Tours. Next June, Calzaretta and Southwick Hess are leading a Walla Walla student trip to Ireland, England, and France in conjunction with Education First tours.

"My goal is to gain information and to have a chance to work with the EF training staff & experienced group leaders in order to safely lead our group of 52 travelers," Southwick Hess said. "I've traveled with students, but never internationally. This training will cover details of taking care of passports, managing customs and foreign language issues."

EF offers training tours for first time International group leaders in London, Paris, Madrid, Berlin, Rome & Beijing. Calzaretta and Southwick Hess qualified for the longer Beijing training because the Walla Walla student group is so large.

"I also hope to bring this trip back to the students by sharing the history & culture of this great Chinese city," Southwick Hess said. "I will also be sharing this experience with the parents of our travelers. They need to know that their children will be well cared for, educated and inspired by our trip next June."

# Wa-Hi football team joins the Fight Against Muscular Dystrophy

Football coaches from Walla Walla High School and Southridge High School will be wearing armbands during the varsity football game Friday night to show their support for Coach to Cure MD and the fight against this terrible disease. Donations will be gathered throughout the game. Kick-off is at 7 p.m.

Coach to Cure MD is a partnership between Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy and the American Football Coaches Association. The goal of Coach to Cure MD is to raise national awareness of Duchenne muscular dystrophy and to raise money to fund research for a cure.

Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy is a progressive muscle disorder that causes loss of muscle function and independence which includes decline in respiratory and cardiac function. Boys with Duchenne face loss of mobility and wheelchair dependency. Duchenne primarily affects boys. One boy out of every 3500 live male births will be diagnosed with Duchenne.

"There is no cure, but there is great hope and promising treatments on the horizon," said organizer Amanda Hammond. "There are boys right here in Walla Walla fighting this terrible disorder."
