School Bus Safety: I am writing to let everyone know the week of October 22-26, 2012 is NATIONAL SCHOOL BUS SAFETY WEEK. Walla Walla School District school buses transport over 2,500 students total each day to and from school. Safety of all students is our number one priority. Our drivers, bus aides, mechanics, and office support staff receive extensive training in all areas vital to each position to assure the safety all students. Walla Walla School District buses travel a total of more than 350,000 miles annually and are subject to mandatory state inspections bi-annually.

This year's focus for National School Bus Safety week is the "DANGER ZONE" around the school bus for students. The Danger Zone is the space all around the school bus. It extends out ten feet in all directions from the bus. It is very difficult for the driver to see students in this zone. It is especially important when the bus is at student bus stops. As you go about your daily business, please be aware of students traveling to and from school, whether it be on a school bus, walking, or bicycling. Everyone plays a part in student safety when traveling roadways. When you are in a hurry and you "GET CAUGHT BEHIND A SCHOOL BUS", please take a deep breath and remember keeping students safe is the number one priority.
