Sievertsen and Bergevin will organize activities to help educate the community regarding the Walla Walla High School bond election scheduled for February 12, 2013.

Improved teaching and learning spaces top priority of Walla Walla High School bond

Walla Walla Public Schools will seek a \$48 million bond on the February 12, 2013 Special Election to fund a \$69.6 million modernization of Walla Walla High School.

All of the existing 1963 buildings will be remodeled and upgraded in the design to reduce costs. The project is eligible for \$21.6 million in State Matching dollars which will be used on the Wa-Hi project. Should there be any excess funds, they will be dedicated for facility improvements at Lincoln High School.

Cost is an increase of 68 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. The recently approved College Place School District bond was \$2.67 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Jerry Cummings, executive director of the Blue Mountain Chapter of the Red Cross, paid a visit to the Walla Walla High School Latino Club this past Thursday. He came to thank the Club for their recent \$200 donation to support the Red Cross efforts to provide help to victims of Hurricane Sandy.

Walla Walla High School FFA Tractor Driving team takes state title

Walla Walla High School students Reed Curcio, Jed Eastman, and Hayden Leber won the State Tractor Driving championship Nov. 9. Curcio took 1st place in the individual category, Eastman was 2nd place individual and Leber earned a 7th place finish. The competition included 17 FFA chapters and 27 teams.

Students competing in the Tractor Driving Competition must complete a written test with questions regarding tractor safety, mechanics, and operating procedures; identify parts on a tractor; and drive a tractor and trailer through a course. The operating course requires students to weave the tractor and trailer through cones going forward and in reverse. They also attempt to not hit or touch the cones, make unnecessary changes of direction, grind the gears and a number of other operating mistakes. They must navigate the course within two minutes and thirty seconds.

The team of Samantha Zuger, Michaela Stalder, and John Mihelitch, first time competitors at the State event, placed 22nd. Thanks to FFA Advisor Lindsey Butcher for all her work preparing the teams for competition.
