Board adopts 2011-12 budget

District cash reserves remain strong

School board members approved the 2011-2012 budget during Tuesday's school board meeting. District Chief Financial Officer **Pat Johnston** reported the General Fund budget is based on \$60,401,441 in revenue and \$62,091,263 in expenditures.

Despite dipping into reserves to balance the General Fund budget, the district will maintain an ending fund balance of \$6,120,571 or a 9.8 percent reserve. Johnston said the district faced revenue reduction of \$529,050 for this fiscal year. She said Governor Gregoire has hinted additional mid-year cuts could come if the economic forecast does not improve.

The district will not see any staff cuts or significant program changes. Johnston said spending reduction efforts the past several years and increased student enrollment in recent years has helped the district weather the global recession. The district is budgeting for 100 more students in 2011-12. The district has grown more than 300 students in the past five years, Johnston said.

Extra police patrols in school zones

Motorists should be on the look out for extra law enforcement patrols in school zones as the district begins a new school year. City and county officers will be stepping up patrols to help keep students safe. City firefighters will also be out near school zones the next couple of weeks to promote safety and community involvement.

Reser Road Update - Bridge construction to begin

Walla Walla County Update:

Yellowhawk Bridge:

Contractors are planning to install the new Yellowhawk Bridge on Reser Road this summer. Construction on the bridge will begin this week. There will be no through traffic on Reser Road until approximately October 1, 2011. After October 1, there will be limited access for through traffic until the project is completed in December 2011.

Estimated Project Completion Date - December 2011:

Walla Walla County is now estimating the entire Reser Road project will be completed in early December 2011. (*Weather permitting and barring any other unforeseen circumstance)

Access to Prospect Point (during Bridge construction):

Access to Prospect is only available via Reser Road from the west until at least October 1. There will be limited access to Prospect Point from the east of Reser Road until the project is completed in December 2011. A new Howard Street entrance/exit will be ready to use later this month.

Access to Walla Walla High School off Reser Road (during Bridge construction):

Access to Walla Walla High School is only available via Reser Road from the east until at least after October 1. There will be limited access to Walla Walla High School from the west on Reser Road until the project is completed in December 2011.

Walla Walla County Project Manager Aaron Grimm will provide updates to the school district weekly or as needed until the project is completed. Grimm thanks everyone for their patience and support during this project.

Walla Walla High School Principal Pete Peterson - Reser Road Update

As most members of the Walla Walla community know, Reser Road is undergoing significant reconstruction that will improve our students and adults safety as they travel to Wa-Hi and to Prospect Point Elementary. While that improvement takes place, we ask that you remain patient with traffic flow that may become congested, and we ask that your high school students take extra time coming and going from Wa-Hi.

Our timeline as of today puts replacement of the bridge on Reser Road finishing around October 1, with full project completion around December 1. This will be dependent on weather. Student and adult access to the gym parking lot will be accessible via Fern and Reser during construction through December, but it will require extra time and forethought in order to navigate the roadway. Students who will be driving to school and NOT leaving during the school day will be able to enter via Fern to park in the gym lot and not notice many delays. This includes athletes who are participating in fall or winter sports for both practices and for contests.

Students who are driving to Wa-Hi and plan to leave during the lunch period may very well run into significant delays. These delays on Reser Road will most likely make them late or even absent from classes after lunch if they choose to park in the gym lot, due to the fact the bridge construction will not allow students to exit from the gym and go west toward Prospect Point and Howard. Any students who wish to leave during lunch should park in the Fern lot or Murr Field lot, as this will ensure that they can avoid the construction on Reser Road. While this may require your student to walk farther, it will ensure that they are able to avoid potential delays in coming or leaving from Wa-Hi as well as any disciplinary action that occurs from repeated tardies or unexcused absences.

Lincoln Health Center continues to meet needs

More support needed to address substance abuse

Student Health Options Executive Director Holly Howard provided an update to school board members on the Lincoln Health Center and other programs related to this non-profit organization. Howard said most Lincoln students continue to use the Lincoln Health Center for a variety of services, including preventative health care, immunizations, counseling and program placement to services not available at the clinic.

The Sherwood Trust awarded Student Health Options a \$113,000 grant to be paid over three years for additional fund development and grant writing support. Howard said the need for drug and alcohol counseling and treatment for teens continues to increase in Walla Walla. She said mental health issues and support addressing these issues is also on the rise. Student Health Options, the oversight organization for the Lincoln Health Center, recently worked with Susan Newton to create a new strategic plan.

Wa-Hi students participate in Hispanic Youth Exploring Engineering and Science Camp

Walla Walla University in College Place hosted eleven Walla Walla High School students for five days at the Hispanic Youth Exploring Engineering and Sciences Camp (HYEES) from August 1 to 5, 2011. The camp is presented and operated by the WWU's Edward F. Cross School of Engineering and Exploring Post 311 in cooperation with the Bonneville Power Administration.

The primary objectives of the program are to expose students to the various disciplines of higher education and increase excitement and awareness of what is needed to study science and engineering. Through efforts by the camp staff and guest speakers, the message to the students is why pursuing a baccalaureate degree and higher education is so important to their future.

The students attended the camp as part of Exploring Post 311's program to promote career awareness to high school students in the Walla Walla community. Exploring is sponsored by the Learning for Life program which is a subsidiary of the Boy Scouts of America.
