### School board sets February 14, 2012 for the four-year replacement levy election

*Levy rates similar to those approved in 2008*

Walla Walla Public Schools Board of Directors, during a special school board meeting Tuesday night, unanimously approved February 14, 2012 as the date for the district's four-year Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy. The dollar amount and estimated rates for the replacement levy are similar to those approved in 2008. An election resolution will now be filed with Walla Walla County. *Dates and approval:*

- Election date: Tuesday, February 14, 2012
- Ballots mailed: Friday, January 27, 2012
- 50% + 1 vote required for approval
- Four-year levy

*Replacement Levy Facts*

- Proposed taxpayer levy rates are similar to last year's rates
- Increases in home values will not increase tax collections
- Replacement levy funds about 20% of the district's budget
- Levy funding pays for library staff and health clinicians
- Levy dollars lower class size, fund training and buy materials
- Pays for specialists not funded by the state (PE & Music)
- Funds all extra-curricular activities (music, sports, drama, FFA)
- Voters approved a similar levy in 2008
- Levy dollars help employ more than 100 staff

### **Garrison Night School classes scheduled - registration begins November 15**

Registration will begin soon for Garrison Night School. This is an adult education program offered in a partnership between Walla Walla Community College and Walla Walla Public Schools. You can register at Walla Walla Community College any time during the day. On November 15-17, there will be evening registration at the college from 5:00-7:00. Classes begin Monday, November 28, 2011, and end Thursday, March 1, 2012 with an evening of celebration.

The mission of Garrison Night School is to promote the education of Hispanic parents by connecting them to the school community, preparing them for a General Education Diploma and facilitating their enrollment in college, thus raising the educational level and standard of living of the family.

Classes are held at Garrison Middle School (906 Chase St.) in Walla Walla. Classes this year include General Education Diploma (GED) preparation and five levels of English as a Second Language (ESL). These classes are from 6:00 PM-8:00 PM Monday through Thursday. Basic E-Learning will be offered nightly from 5:00-6:00. A \$25 registration fee which covers all classes taken is required for the E-Learning, GED and ESL classes. Some scholarships are available as is a free children's program.

The extended day learning program for the children is supported through the Millennial's program that serves Garrison Middle School students and Blue Ridge Elementary School students and the Title III Federal Bilingual Program grant.

Beginning Spanish for native English speakers will be taught on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6 to 8 p.m., and Advanced Beginning Spanish for native English speakers will be taught on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6 to 8 p.m. The fee for the Spanish class is \$150.00. Registration for these classes is at the Walla Walla School District Business office.

Bill Bialozor, Senior Army Instructor for the Walla Walla High School's Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps program.

Kilpatrick said that he joined JROTC because he wanted to become a more determined and respectable citizen. He plans to go to college for two years, and then become a firefighter. He enjoys playing the guitar.

"His strongest competitive category was his answering technique," said Cadet Command Sgt. Maj. Malachi Matthews. "This Cadet of the Month was a close match, since the Cadets' performances were all outstanding."

First runner up was Cadet Private Allison Shrouf, a 16-year-old sophomore, whose strongest suit was her military knowledge. She came in second with 69 points. Second runner up was Cadet Private Timothy Howard, a 15-year-old sophomore, whose strongest suit was military courtesy. He came in third with 42 points.

"After the board tallied the points and the winner was clear, we held a ceremony to promote the winning Cadet one rank higher, to recognize him for his hard work and personal success," said Bialozor.

Wa-Hi JROTC Cadets participate in the program to develop leadership skills and to strive to be better citizens in society. Many Cadets compete with drill, marksmanship, and physical training teams as well as attend the class. These Cadets get to travel to and compete in drill meets at 16 other schools in the Cascade Division that include Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Navy Cadet programs.

### **Sharpstein School Garden fall wrap up - By Beth Thiel**

Students at Sharpstein Elementary continue to benefit from their school garden. This fall many volunteer parents and grandparents provided hands on learning experiences in garden produce harvesting, preparing, cooking and tasting. These activities included lessons in nutrition, math, science, history and geography.

Every class visited the garden starting with an introduction for the kindergarten class that included a taste of kohlrabi and heirloom chocolate cherry tomatoes. First grade harvested the tomatoes and peppers that they planted in the spring as Kinders to make a tasty salsa. Weeks later, some students were still making salsa at home with their new recipe. The second grade milled corn from their three sister's garden, made dough which they squished into tortillas for quesadillas. Some of third grade harvested and tasted carrots and others harvested lettuce seeds to keep over winter for planting in the spring, which is a nice compliment to their science unit on seeds.

Fifth grade harvested, scrubbed, cut, prepared and cooked their potatoes to serve to the entire school. In addition to experiencing how to plant and harvest potatoes, students learned geography through hearing the history of the potato, what nutritional value they hold and simple, healthy ways to cook potatoes. Fourth grade will complete perhaps a less satisfying, but the most important activity of maintaining the healthy soils in the garden. They will learn the composition of healthy soil and a variety of ways to maintain healthy soils while carrying out the various methods in the garden.

The success and continued utilization of the school garden is dependent on volunteers and accommodating teachers. A great big thank you goes out to all who helped with the various class activities and the fall clean up activity attended by parents and students. Your contribution is important! Thank you!
