Four districts announce new Mid Columbia Conference

Tri-Cities and Walla Walla athletes will be playing in a new conference when the 2012-2013 school year begins. Officials from Pasco, Kennewick, Richland, and Walla Walla school districts announced this week that the new conference will be called the Mid Columbia Conference.

The districts announced on January 27 that they would be leaving the CBBN, citing economic circumstances and the desire to keep staff and students in class as the two primary drivers in the decision. The new Mid Columbia Conference will greatly reduce travel distance, which will both save districts money and require less lost instruction time.

The Mid Columbia Conference will consist of Pasco High School, Chiawana High School, Walla Walla High School, Kennewick High School, Kamiakin High School, Southridge High School, Richland High School and Hanford High School and will be a mixed 3A and 4A league.

Community Bank adopts local schools

Tuesday night Community Bank Chief Executive Officer Tom Moran presented a \$1000 check to Superintendent Mick Miller to launch a new Adopt-a-School program. Green Park and Blue Ridge Elementary Schools will both receive \$500 to support students in financial need. Funds may be used to assist students to purchase school lunches, classroom supplies, and any other items that would benefit them in their pursuit of an education. Selection of recipients of funds will be entirely at the discretion of teachers and/or counselors at the respective schools.

“We recognize that an investment in people and their education is a smart investment in the community,” said Moran. “Community Bank wants to get more involved in the community and schools are a great place to start.”

Community Bank identified Green Park and Blue Ridge based upon the significant percentage of students who participate in the free or reduced-priced school lunch program. Moran said the bank hopes this program is the start of a long and mutually beneficial relationship.

Nomination/referral materials are now available in all district elementary and middle schools for the 2012-13 Explorer (Gifted Education) Program. Parents with students in grades 2 through 7 may contact their child’s teacher or school learning specialist/middle school counselor for more information. Walla Walla School District’s Explorer Program provides students of high academic and intellectual ability with designated time to explore concepts in greater depth. Classes are currently offered for students in grade 3 through 8.

The goal of the Explorer Program is to encourage the development of higher level thinking skills. Students learn to become responsible for their own learning, to develop their creative thinking and critical reasoning power and to strive to reach their potential. The Explorer curriculum for third through fifth grades focuses primarily on mathematics, science, oral and written communication and critical thinking skills. Elementary students are bussed to Sharpstein Elementary School for two half-days per week. At each middle school, curriculum focuses on the humanities, drawn from the areas of language arts and social studies, and offers advanced, but parallel, learning opportunities.

The nomination/referral deadline this year is March 14, 2012. All referred students will take a norm-referenced standardized test and those who qualify for further testing will participate in cognitive abilities testing, also at their home schools. In all cases, parents will be notified of the results of the process, and a child not selected one year may be referred again in subsequent years. Walla Walla High School students rank first in technology exam

Last semester, Walla Walla High School Career and Technical Education teachers piloted the Microsoft IT Academy from a partnership between Microsoft and OSPI. This academy offered students the opportunity to take the certification exams, an internationally recognized Microsoft exam. A total of 24 students have passed either the PowerPoint, Word, or Access certification exams, a rigorous 50 minute, proctored exam.

“Currently, we are #1 on the leaderboard for pass rate percentage!” said CTE teacher Gay Buissink.

All staff members who teach the course at Wa-Hi have completed IT Academy training and have been certified as proctors of these professional exams.

“We feel that a student who earns certification will have a competitive advantage in the workplace against those who have not earned this prestigious, internationally-recognized standard of excellence as recognized by Microsoft,” said CTE teacher Scott Reardon. “We hope we can get several more students certified this spring so that we can get Wa-Hi in the top five in the state in the total number of certification exams passed.”

Over President’s Day Weekend students from Wa-Hi and Lincoln competed in the State Qualifying Tournament in Speech and Debate at Chiawana High School in Pasco. Students from Moses Lake, Wenatchee, Cascade, Quincy, Liberty Bell, Ephrata, Othello, Eisenhower, Pasco and Chiawana also competed.

In a combined 3A and 4A division, Walla Walla High School placed 1st in Debate. Pasco was 1st in Speech in the combined 3A and 4A division. Overall, combining Speech and Debate, in the 4A division, Chiawana H.S. was 1st with 78 points and Walla Walla H.S. was 2nd with 69 points. Points are given for each 1st -3rd place finisher in each event. The Walla Walla H.S. team had its strongest showing yet in Debate Events at a State Qualifying meet. The State Debate Tournament will be held March 16 & 17 at Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington. We qualified competitors in every form of debate.

- In Congressional Debate, Marisol Beck (junior), Maggie Grant (freshman) and Emma Gregoire (freshman) will attend the State tournament. Marisol Beck placed 2nd out of 32 competitors. Students will debate a variety of bills including birthright citizenship, the Bush tax cuts and the Keystone pipeline.
- In Public Forum Debate, debating if the United States should suspend aid to Pakistan, the freshman team of Malcolm Gabbard and Emily Prull were District Champions and advanced to State.
- In Lincoln-Douglas Debate, Rosa Tobin (junior) was undefeated and is the District Champion. She will debate whether or not targeted killings are a morally permissible foreign policy tool at the State tournament.
- In Speech we had a large number of students qualify. The State Speech Tournament (also known as the State IE (Individual Events) Tournament) will be held at the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma Washington on March 10th:
- In Extemp: Rosa Tobin placed 3rd, Kendall Dunovant 5th, Malcolm Gabbard 7th and Bryan Preston 9th. 1st alternate is Emily Prull
- In Dual Interpretation: Hope Grant-Herriot and Marisol Beck were 3rd and Kurt Funk and Maggie Grant were 5th.
- In Expository: Anna Apostolidis was District Champion, Kate Kuhlmann was 3rd, Ben Parsons 4th, Sabine Vernon 7th.
- In Impromptu: Emily Prull was 3rd, Bryan Preston 5th, Kendall Dunovant 6th, Rosa Tobin 9th.
- In Interpretive Reading: Anna Apostolidis was District Champion, Marisol Beck 3rd, Kera Parsons 4th.
- In Original Oratory: Hope Grant-Herriot was 2nd, Kimberly McLaughlin 5th, Tristan Moore 7th, and Calvin Brigham 9th. Emma Gregoire is 1st alternate.
- In Humorous Interpretation: Konor Clark was 4th and Malcolm Gabbard was 6th.

Overall, in Debate six students qualified to State and in Speech, 18 students qualified.

Wa-Hi AVID students celebrate achievement

Erin Jones, OSPI Assistant Superintendent of Student Achievement delivered a powerful keynote speech to the students.

Jones' made three key points during her message:

1. It doesn't matter where you come from, it's where you end.
2. Every decision matters.
3. Set goals.

AVID, Advancement Via Individual Determination, is an elementary through postsecondary college readiness system that is designed to increase schoolwide learning and performance. AVID students are expected to access rigorous curriculum and the elective class is an avenue for students to acquire the skills in communication, critical thinking, note-taking, peer-tutoring, organization and time-management.

Last year, all fifteen of the seniors in the AVID program went on to higher education institutions after high school. The AVID project is a collaborative effort between Washington State University GEAR UP, Walla Walla Public Schools, and our community.
