Superintendent Miller takes viewers on a walking tour of Wa-Hi

Walla Walla Public Schools will seek a \$48 million bond on the February 12, 2013 Special Election to fund a \$69.6 million modernization of Walla Walla High School. A new video has been added to the district web site and YouTube page featuring Superintendent Mick Miller taking viewers on a walking tour of the campus. Per the bond proposal, all of the existing 1963 buildings will be remodeled and upgraded in the design to reduce costs. The project is eligible for \$21.6 million in State Matching dollars which will be used on the Wa-Hi project.

Cost is an increase of 68 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. The recently approved College Place School District bond was \$2.67 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Walla Walla High School and Prospect Point placed in lockdown following police activity near school

Walla Walla High School and Prospect Point Elementary were placed in Yellow, or modified, Lockdown this morning after reports of potentially dangerous police activity near the schools. The district followed the recommendation of the Walla Walla County Sheriff and went into the lockdown per district safety procedures. This lockdown has been lifted per the recommendation of Sheriff John Turner. The lockdown was in effect from approximately 9 to 9:30 a.m.

The police activity involved a vehicle driving on Reser Road traveling east bound. The Sheriff Department received reports of possible shots being fired from the vehicle. The district took all necessary steps to keep staff and students safe. The district strives to work cooperatively with law enforcement.

Sheriff Turner reports they are continuing to investigate the area and look for a vehicle based on the description reported to his office.

Prospect Point Elementary named state School of Distinction for second consecutive year

Prospect Point Elementary was one of six schools in the Educational Service District (ESD) 123 region and 97 in the state to be recognized as 2012 Schools of Distinction. This is the second consecutive year Prospect Point Elementary has earned this distinction. The annual award is given by The Center for Educational Effectiveness (CEE), the Association of Educational Service Districts (AESD), the Association of Washington School Principals (AWSP), Phi Delta Kappa-Washington Chapter (PDK-WA), Washington Association of School Administrators (WASA), Washington State ASCD and Washington State School Directors' Association (WSSDA).

ESD 123 will honor Prospect Point and Parkway Elementary of Clarkston at an awards reception in Walla Walla Friday, December 14 at 10 a.m. at the Walla Walla Public Schools Board Room (364 S. Park St.). This announcement represents the 6th annual School of Distinction award recognition in Washington state.

“I am fortunate to be part of a staff that is committed to student learning,” said Prospect Point Principal Chris Gardea. “The Prospect Point community continues to strive for improvement that directly benefits our students. I am so proud of their accomplishment and feel privileged to be part of such a dedicated group of parents and educators who continually put students first.”

Federal Farm-to-School Grant Program plows the way for more local produce in Walla Walla schools

Walla Walla Public Schools was awarded a \$96,000 United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Grant to increase local foods and education in district schools. The funding will also enhance educational opportunities for students, staff and the community about food and agriculture.

Longtime school garden advocate, parent volunteer and nutrition specialist Beth Thiel has been contracted to serve as the Farm-to-School grant coordinator for the school district.

“The goals of this grant will benefit students and the entire community by increasing the purchase of locally grown food for our school cafeterias,” said Thiel. “It will also help us expand the utilization of school gardens, better educate young students about food and farming and teach district staff and parents about cooking healthy meals.”

This fall Walla Walla students saw an increase in the amount and variety of fruits, vegetables and legumes served in school lunches; a requirement of the National School Lunch Program’s Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010. Walla Walla students in grades K-12 are required to have at least a half a cup of fruits or vegetables on their tray at every meal.

“This is a positive change for student health,” said Thiel. “The Farm-to-School program aims to ensure students are eating those extra fruits and vegetables daily.”

One strategy Thiel is introducing in Walla Walla is working with area farmers to bring in more locally grown produce. Thiel says this move and others will entice students to make healthier food choices.

“By providing the freshest, most flavorful local produce, we can influence student preference for healthy foods,” said Thiel. “School gardens and cooking activities, as well as farm field trips and farmer visits to schools, also play critical roles in educating students.”

District Nutrition Services Department staff also benefit from the grant. These staff will participate in culinary classes, take tours to local farms and meet with area chefs to enhance the meals they are serving.

“The Nutrition Services Department is excited for the opportunity and now has the resources to build an excellent Farm-to-School program that will fit the needs of school children in Walla Walla,” said Pamela Milleson, Director of Nutrition Services. “We live in a unique area which can provide a variety of produce and educational experience for our students.”

Exchange Club President earns Pete and Hedda Reid Service Award

Brian Dohe, director of annual giving, is the 2012 recipient of the Pete and Hedda Reid Service to Walla Walla Award, presented Nov. 28 at the Walla Walla Chamber of Commerce Awards Banquet.

Formerly called the Town-Gown Award, it recognizes Whitman staff and faculty who have made significant contributions to the community. The award is presented jointly by Whitman and the Chamber and comes with a \$1,000 stipend. Multiple members of the Whitman community contributed to nominating Dohe. Among comments written on his behalf:

“Always a quick smile and positive attitude makes being a colleague of Brian’s a privilege. Because he does not talk about what he does for others, one would never know the difference he has made in our community.”

“Brian is highly invested in the Walla Walla community and spends personal time and energy in making this a better place to live. His involvement in community service is genuine and heartfelt and Brian enjoys connecting with people and making a difference.”

Dohe has worked at Whitman for 21 years, in which time he has served on the fundraising committee for Friends and on the boards of the Blue Mountain Arts Alliance and Walla Walla Valley Chamber of Commerce. Described in his nomination as the “consummate volunteer,” Dohe currently serves as president of Exchange Club and chairman of the Financial Development Committee and secretary of the board for the WW Community Council.

Per Whitman tradition, this award was presented in memory of a college staff or faculty member who has passed away – in this case, Dr. George Ball. Dr. Ball founded the religion department at Whitman 41 years ago and was a beloved teacher and mentor to generations of Whitman students. An ordained Methodist minister with a Ph.D. from Yale Divinity School, Dr. Ball was known for delivering flowers to Whitman staff and picking up litter along his bicycle routes across campus. In 2010, his legacy was honored by the creation of the George H. Ball Endowed Chair in the Humanities.

“I counted Dr. Ball as a colleague and mentor from the moment that I arrived in Housing and Residence Life in 1991, and through my time in Annual Giving when we were in adjacent offices,” Dohe says. “It deepens the significance of this award to receive it in the year that it’s given in memory of Dr. Ball.”

Dohe is married to Walla Walla High School English teacher Lori Dohe.
