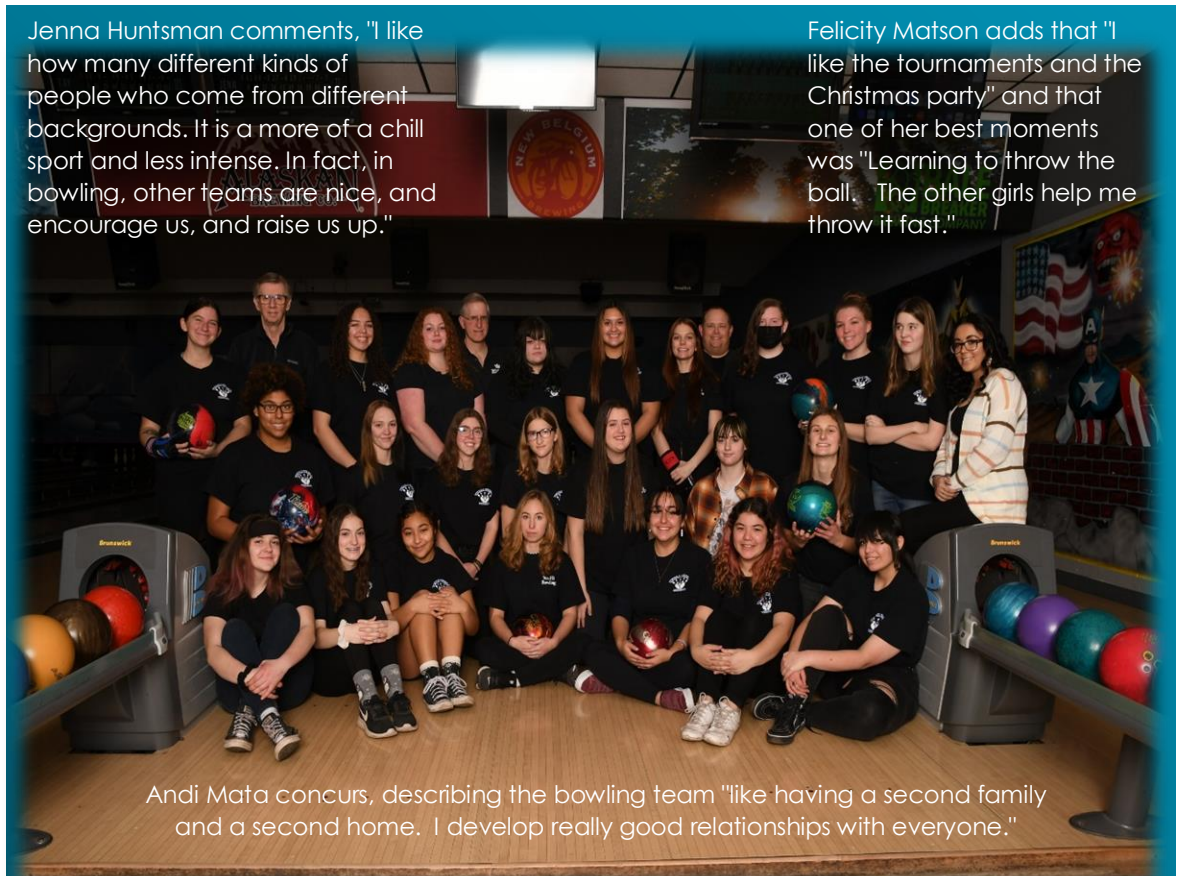

The Walla Walla High School Bowling Team is a place where students belong. The team began in 2014 with 12 girls. In seven years, this number has grown to 37 girls on the roster, with at least one bowler going to state every year but two. The team has also been to state twice. One only has to be an observer to recognize the uplifting environment of this bowling team. Coach Jason Postlewait and his team of coaches focus on the positive, on growth, on inspiring the team both individually and collectively. So what makes bowling a place where students belong? Here is what a few of the girls had as comments:

Jenna Huntsman comments, "I like how many different kinds of people who come from different backgrounds. It is a more-of-a chill sport and less intense. In fact, in bowling, other teams are nice, and encourage us, and raise us up."

Felicity Matson adds that "I like the tournaments and the Christmas party" and that one of her best moments was "Learning to throw the ball. The other girls help me throw it fast."



Andi Mata concurs, describing the bowling team "like having a second family and a second home. I develop really good relationships with everyone."

Indeed, those good relationships are evident as one observes the girls in both practices and matches. Coach Postlewait adds "The bowling program here at Walla Walla High School is a great way to have fun while getting involved with our high school community. The girls are very supportive of each other, and as coaches we strive to promote that family atmosphere of belonging and caring for each other."

Clearly, the sense of belonging is alive and well with Walla Walla High School Bowlers. In fact, former WA-HI alumni such as Riley Elia and Kerigan O'Connor have returned as volunteer coaches and provide support to the team as well. This team approach creates and sustains this sense of belonging: cheering, encouraging and motivating each other. Senior bowler Jenna adds that "When I get a bad roll, I always see the positive, even if I only knock down one pin, that's one pin less." With a mindset focused on the positive, everyone belongs in bowling!

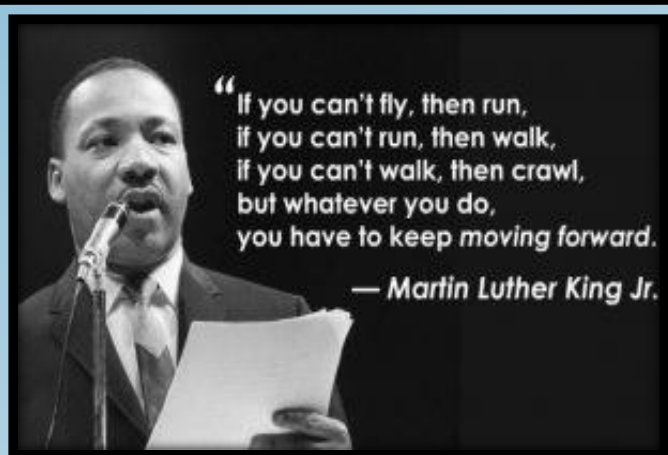

Walla Walla Public School's Long Term English Learner (LTEL) Specialist Amy Kasenga transplanted here after graduating from Bloomsburg University of Pennsylvania where she graduated with dual majors in Elementary Education and Early Childhood Development. As a student athlete on the Women's Soccer team at BU, Amy was first team All-American, first team All-Northeast Region, first team All-PSAC, ISAA Scholar-Athlete second team All-America, and was twice awarded the NCAA Division II ISAA National Player of the Year and was selected to play in the Senior All-Star game. To cap off her senior year, Kasenga was awarded Bloomsburg's Eleanor Wray Outstanding Senior Female Athlete Award. She was inducted into the Hall of Fame at BU in 2013. Amy's passion for sports is what led her to coach and teach children of all ages.

Throughout her 27 years in education, Amy has added several teaching credentials to her certification. She received a Masters in Curriculum and Instruction with an endorsement in English as a Second Language from Portland State University as well as a Spanish endorsement and has been a National Board Certified in English as a New Language; Early Adolescence Through Young Adult for the past 11 years.

Amy moved to Walla Walla after teaching in White Salmon School District and coaching varsity soccer to become part of the dual language program at Blue Ridge Elementary in 2016. Since her arrival, she has been part of the Guiding Coalitions at Blue Ridge and Garrison Middle School, the Teacher Leadership Cadre for Spanish Language Development, Dual Language professional development K-8, EL Achieve's Constructing Meaning workshops, and now serves as the district's first LTEL Specialist.
