Committee Accomplishments:


- Convened over two dozen accountability review meetings and on-site inspections

- Will ensure any remaining bond proceeds after project completion are returned to voters in order to reduce the cost to local taxpavers





Neher gives lasting gift to the community

>> Lifelong Walla Walla resident Dick Neher was known for giving back to the community he loved dearly as an educator, legislator, father, grandfather and husband. But it was on a blistering hot summer day in 2018 the legendary Walla Walla High School graduate, principal, coach and teacher returned to his former school to share one of his last gifts to the community. After learning about

the district's proposed bond, that would help preserve the iconic Wa-Hi campus he loved so much, Neher offered to Superintendent Smith to be the voice and face of the upcoming bond election; an election that promised to renovate rather than tear down the 55-year-old high school campus.

He was also impressed with the district's plans to preserve the historic century-old Lincoln High School building as well as necessary updates planned for the 68-year-old Pioneer Middle School facility. Neher, who served as an educator in Walla Walla for over three decades, including 20 years as

principal of Walla Walla High School, calmly wiped the sweat from his brow as he proudly made his way across the expansive campus narrating an all-important informational video that would later be viewed by thousands. Bond measures to renovate Walla Walla High School had failed in three previous attempts, but not this time. On

November 6, 2018, community members overwhelmingly supported the largest bond measure in district history with a 73% percent YES

This passing opened the door for approximately \$120M in critical facility improvements, with Olympia picking up nearly half the tab in unprecendented state matching dollars which greatly


> minimized the cost to local taxpayers. The combined local and state grant resources were sufficient to renovate the three schools and provide essential voter-approved facility and safety updates to other campuses across the district. Regrettably, just three weeks following this historic election night, Neher passed away at his home after ongoing health conditions. He was 87. In a letter Neher sent to Superintendent Smith, just prior to his passing, Neher congratulated the district noting that, "I have been involved in numerous bond issues throughout my sixty three years associated in various capacities with our district and this was the best pre-bond preparation I have observed." Neher's legacy will live on at Walla

Walla High School through the Dick Neher Student Plaza located outside the Commons area. A bronze plaque with his photo, name and career scope will be mounted in the plaza for everyone to enjoy. Dick Neher always put others first and his impact in the community will be felt for generations. <<



School Safety and preserving the district's aging infrastructure were high priorities for the Community Facilities Task Force when it assisted the district in developing a longrange facilities improvement plan prompting the successful 2018 bond proposal. Safety improvements included new access control systems to easily lock doors and guard against unwanted intruders. Technology enhancements and improved school communications systems across campuses were addressed. New roofs were also a priority and Berney, Green Park and Blue Ridge (now WWCCF) Elementary Schools all received new roof systems. Berney also received a new heating and cooling system.

Pioneer Middle School Renovation

the devastating fire that damaged a portion of Pioneer Middle School in December 1990. Insurance claims paid for repairs of the spaces damaged by the fire, while the rest of the 1950's era school largely went untouched for the next 30 plus years. The successful 2018 bond changed all that by paving the way for an extensive renovation and expansion of the 70-year-old school. A new main entrance addition next to the gym improves commons and kitchen were expanded, a new physical education and activities center was added and the original 1950's gym and

Those who have lived in Walla Walla since the 1990s remember locker rooms were completely renovated. The 1950's wing on the south side of the campus was completely modernized, larger and improved music classrooms were added, new state-of-the-art science classrooms and modern art room were constructed and all portables were removed. A new parking lot was added, traffic flow improvements were made to Bridge and Roosevelt Streets and safety and technology upgrades were made campuswide. The school now features a modern heating and cooling system, safety by establishing a single access point to the school. The energy efficient windows, better insulation, electrical updates and plumbing improvements.



Lincoln High School Renovation

historic schools like Sharpstein and Green Park Elementaries to serve future generations for decades to come. This trend continued when district leaders and the Community Facilities Task Force listened to the Walla Walla Historic Preservation Commission and decided to renovate Lincoln High School. Local architect Henry Osterman designed Paine Elementary. now Lincoln High School, in the 1920's before the school opened in 1927. Osterman, who also designed the Liberty Theater and Walla Walla Carnegie Library, will have his legacy live on at Lincoln High School thanks to a 14-month, comprehensive

Walla Walla Public Schools has a proud tradition of restoring renovation project. All of the century-old classrooms were updated with new lighting, technology, flooring and fire supression. The school now features a modern heating and cooling system, energy efficient windows, better insulation, electrical updates and plumbing improvements. A new entrance addition off 3rd Avenue improves safety by establishing a single-access point to the school, ADA accessibly and elevator. The addition also houses a new drama and fine arts black box theater. Minor improvements were made to the 1964 wing, the aged portables were removed and the parking lot was expanded

the Community Facilities Task Force in the fall of 2016 to assist in the development of a long-range Facilities Improvement Plan. Under the leadership of local businessman and Graduate of Distinction Paul Schneidmiller, the Community Facilities Task Force developed a plan focused on needs, not wants, based on community input. The approved plan ensured every dollar spent was effectively prioritized and allocated to achieve the maximum benefit to every student, while controlling costs for taxpayers.



Walla Walla High School Renovation

Constructed on the south-end of Walla Walla with breathtaking views of the majestic Blue Mountains, Walla Walla High School has been the crown jewel of the community at its current location for nearly six decades. This fall the iconic school welcomed students and staff back to a fully renovated and expanded facility. Improvements can be seen at all buildings across the sprawling campus. The Commons features a brand housing the student store, more seating space and new energy Abbott Road. The original science and academic buildings were stripped to the studs and rebuilt to today's construction with permanent spaces.

and learning standards. All buildings have new roofs, ADA provisions and air conditioning. A new science wing was added and the original music building was renovated to support the drama program and award-winning music programs. Parking lots have been expanded and improved to enhance safety and traffic flow. The new main entrance at the corner of Abbott Road and Fern Avenue is easier for visitors to access and provides new kitchen and serving lines. It also includes an addition a welcoming feel to the campus. Safety and security have been improved through campus-wide access control systems, efficient fan-fold windows for the north-facing wall seen from better cameras and window treatments in all buildings. And, as promised, all portables have been removed and replaced
