

Student Advisory Council Adult-Life Prep Class

Superintendent Dr. Wade Smith established the Superintendent's Student Advisory Council (SAC) two years ago. The SAC consists of 16 students, in grades 9-12, open to students who currently attend Walla Walla High School, Lincoln High School, Opportunity Program or Walla Walla Online.

The SAC was established by Dr. Smith to intentionally seek out student voice and respond to the specific needs of Walla Walla Public Schools' high school students. The group meets regularly throughout the school year.

SAC students identified the need for an Adult-Life Prep Class as one of their top priorities. This "Adulting 101" course would teach financial literacy, 21st Century skills, mental wellbeing, and important life skills like changing a car tire. The need for this course was born out of surveys the SAC students sent to current and past seniors, in addition to community leaders and parents. Superintendent Smith plans to bring them in

to discuss the class at a future board meeting. Curriculum Coordinator Casey Monahan and Wa-Hi English Teacher Katie Woolcutt discussed how they are working with the students in preparation for developing this new course.

Director of Equity and Dual Programs Dr. Julie Perron established this award to recognize students who promote activities that create and sustain a sense of belonging, fairness, and justice for all students.

Isaac wrote an autobiography about what it is like to be autistic from his perspective. He read his book to students at Prospect Point to bring awareness to autism.

James is an advocate for students on the margins and other students look to him for support and advice. He works hard to engage students in the SEL classrooms.

Minutes from the May 3, 2022 regular study meeting, personnel report, teachers assigned out of endorsement area, May 17 accounts payable and April financial report.

GEAR UP UPDATE

GEAR UP staff reported they will take a student to the Youth Leadership Summit in WA DC this summer and are planning more college visits.

BUDGET/ENROLLMENT

Fiscal Services Director Nancy Taylor reported revenues and expenditures for March are in alignment with projections. The district will closely monitor expenditures throughout the fiscal year to ensure the ending fund balance remains within board requirements of 6 to 8 percent. Currently it is at 6 percent and is expected to end slightly above 7 percent to end the year.

Enrollment was up 11 students from last month, but still remains under beginning year budget projections and well below prior years. This is primarily due to smaller kindergarten and first grade classes. Superintendent Smith reported the limited housing inventory and skyrocketing housing costs in Walla Walla is likely the contributing to the enrollment dip as homeschool and private school numbers remain consistent. He said recent candidates for positions in the district withdrew from consideration due to housing concerns.

Curriculum Adoption

Last night Executive Director of Teaching and Learning Christy Krutulis provided an update to the school board on the adoption of new K-5 science curriculum and new K-12 social emotional learning curriculum. She reported the district's curriculum adoption process met all district guidelines and she will seek approval from the school board in June. Once approved, Krutulis and her team will order materials and set dates for teacher professional development.

Bond Update

Progress continues on bond projects at Walla Walla High School, Lincoln High School and Pioneer Middle School. Students and staff will soon be able to occupy the new black box theater, greenroom/music room and support spaces for the school's drama program.

At Pioneer Middle School, contractors are working on new science classrooms, art room and, exterior siding and site development.

Lincoln High School is getting a complete modernization of the 1927 school. Classrooms are getting finished and the entryway and drama addition are shaping up. All projects remain on budget and on schedule.

Ribbon cutting ceremonies and tours are planned at all three schools this fall.
